Unions Fight for Child Labor Law. POTTSVILLE, Pa., Jan. 10.—At a meeting at Lansford to organize the labor unions into a central body, C. F. Foley, severely scored Senator C. A. Snyder, of this county, for his opposition to the child labor law, and urged miners and other craftsmen to look well to

their own interests. It is said Foley's speech is the preliminary to a united attack by labor leaders on Snyder's record as chairman of the Senate "picking" committee, which held up a number of measures during the last two sessions of the Legislature which are urgently advocated by labor unions.

Oysters Revived From Cold Storage. NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—Neither the waiters nor the carpenter would have been compelled to eat all the oysters at one sitting if Captain Frederick Ockers, of West Sayville, Long Island,

had been around. Captain Ockers has a way of refrigerating the bivalves that keeps them as healthy as a cold storage chicken. Ockers says he has placed oysters in cold storage, and after six weeks they were just as good as the day he put them in. "They are practically subjects of suspended animation," says the captain, "and can be kept until it is desired to bring them back to life. Then they can be thawed out and revived."
