A complete checking of the contribu-tions received up to late yesterday at the office of Ben Selling, treasurer for the Jewish relief fund committee, revasis the fact that the contributions total \$8844.28. Mr. Selling had no way Friday of determining the exact amount of conributions, and his estimate of \$10,000 on hand is expected to be sur-passed by far before the close of the

campaign.

The amount now on hand has been raised, not through personal solicitations on the part of members of the committee, but more than 500 men, women and children have walked into the office of Ben Seiling, treasurer of the relief fund, during the past few days, making all contributions volun-

Contributions have come from rich and poor alike, and when money has been scarce and the willingness to give has been present, jewelry and family heirlooms have been sacrificed to the charitable inclination.

Contribution Time Extended.

It has been decided to extend the time for receiving contributions until the end of the week so that those who have thus far found it inadvisable to make contributions will have full op-

make contributions will have full opportunity to do so.

Mr. Selling yesterday said that the contributions were just beginning to come in as they should, and he hoped by the end of the week that the share of Portland to the relief of the warstricken Jews would be double what the figure is to date.

In explaining why the time has been extended for the receipt of contributions Mr. Selling has this to say:

"There are plenty of good people in the world and Portland has its full proportion of them. While many have given generously there is still a large number of well-to-do persons who have overlooked this appeal or have postponed their giving.
