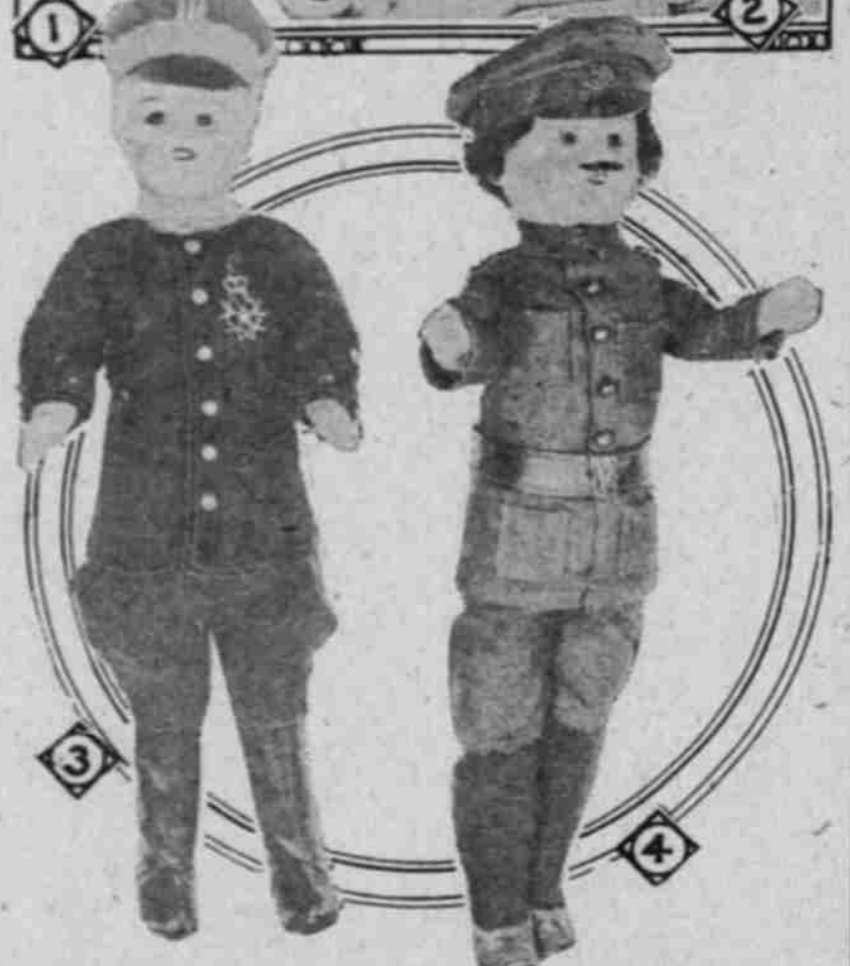

LAYMEN TO EXERT BIG EFFORT

Speeches Are to Be Made in Churches to Stir Interest in Coming Campaign.

REPORTS DUE TOMORROW

Committees Have Districts Well in Hand and Large Delegations From Other Cities Are Expected at Convention.

Supreme efforts for a tremendous showing of registrations for the laymen's convention to be held in Portland February 12-16 are to be made today.

At the "roundup" meeting of those backing the convention, to be held at the Y. M. C. A. Monday noon, reports of the results of the work will be heard.

A canvass of St. Johns is to be made today under the leadership of W. H. Waugh. Mr. Waugh will speak at three of the St. Johns churches in the morning, and following the services will meet the committees from all the St. Johns churches. During the afternoon the canvass will be made, reports of results being turned in at another rally of the committee members at 5 o'clock.

Big Delegation Coming.

Lists of hundreds of names from various cities of the state are being received every day at headquarters and circulars and information relative to the convention are being sent out. It is expected that there will be hundreds of visitors in the city for the gathering.

E. B. Rhodes is to speak to a meeting of all the men of the churches of Vancouver in that city tonight.

A cafeteria dinner is to be held at Oregon City Wednesday night, at which time some of the prominent business men of Portland will be among the speakers. B. O. Peterson, who has been in charge of Methodist Episcopal Church work in the Philippine Islands for the past 16 years, will also be present and will speak.

Methodist Workers' Plan.

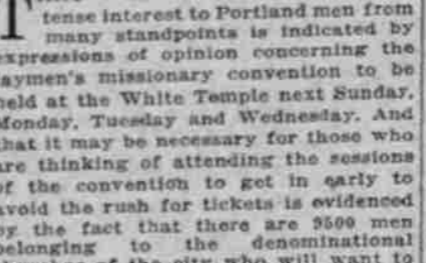
