

DR. PADDACKENDS WORK

CONGREGATIONAL MISSIONARY GOES TO NORTH CAROLINA.

Dissemination Expressed Over Appointment of Boise Man and Invasion of Idaho in Field.

Rev. George E. Paddock, who has served for five years as Congregational home missionary superintendent for Oregon, will be his wife and son, Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Lester, leave on Monday for Tucson, N. C., to become pastor of the Congregational Church.

Rev. A. J. Bullens, pastor of the church at Boise, Idaho, has been appointed to succeed Dr. Paddock, with the territory including Oregon and Idaho as field of labor.

Part of this change there is according to the statement of some of the leading Congregational ministers of the city, a succession of misunderstandings between the Congregational home missionary board of New York and the local pastor.

One of the ministers declared yesterday, commenting on the action of the board, that the local men had not been consulted. He said they had protested against the new order of things, but to no avail.

To adjust matters, Secretary H. F. Woodward of the Congregational Home Missionary Society, will come out from New York during the Laymen's Missionary Convention and will look over the field, hear the grievances of the Oregon pastor and give his ultimatum.

POTATO SUPPLY AMPLE

ATTEMPT MADE TO FOSTER IDEA THAT SHORTAGE IS NEAR.

Eggs and Vegetables Also Are Coming in Sufficiently to Meet Much-Weakened Demand.

Although local produce receipts have fallen off this week, there is no serious shortage in any line.

Certain front-street dealers are seeking to create the impression, by business news, that there is a failing in the potato family. This is not the case. There are plenty of potatoes for all immediate requirements in the produce district, and most of the retail dealers are also well supplied. Besides this, there are 40 carloads of potatoes stored in local warehouses that can be drawn out as needed.

Other dealers are not in a position to take now with the ground covered with snow, but Yakima potato growers are offering their stock to Portland dealers.

California green vegetables have taken the place of Oregon truck. Shipping was interrupted for several days, but a number of cars came through yesterday.

There is no shortage in the egg supply, although receipts have fallen off materially. With the advance in price, consumption has decreased.

At most of the retail stores fresh Oregon raw eggs are selling at 49 to 50 cents.

MR. MCCUSKER HAS HOPE

AIM IS TO HAVE OREGON PRODUCTS USED ON POSTOFFICE BUILDING.

After Correspondence With Senator Chamberlain Belief Is Expressed That Work Will Bring Result.

Following correspondence with Senator Chamberlain and other representatives of the state in Congress, Thomas McCusker, secretary of the Employers' Association, declared yesterday that he was of the opinion, if sufficient pressure were brought to bear, Oregon building material would be specified by the Government for the construction of the new post office.

Mr. McCusker said that department heads at Washington had expressed the belief that it would be necessary to use brick, owing to the size of the appropriation for the construction work. This, he declared, would make it possible for the state to supply all the material required.

Previously, while it was thought possible that sandstone might be used for the superstructure, there was little possibility of Oregon material being specified.

"I am of the opinion," he said last night, "that we can get the federal authorities to consent to the use of Oregon material, but we must work for it. It would mean a big thing for the state, not only in money, but also for advertising the resources here."
