

GOVERNOR OPENS FIRE ON DEMOCRATS

New Freedom for West Now Needed, He Points Out, at Medford, Lincoln Day.

FERRIS BILL ATTACKED

"I Would Rather See One Stream Developed Than a Score Preserved," He Says—Women Attended; Enthusiasm Rampant.

MEDFORD, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—Declaring Oregon's great need to be settled and urging the Republicans of the state to unite so that Democratic rule may be overthrown, Governor Withycombe at tonight's Lincoln day banquet, amid the greatest enthusiasm, opened the 1918 Republican campaign in Jackson County.

Ladies Crowded Galleries. Many ladies crowded the galleries. The climax was reached during the Governor's speech, which was in part as follows:

Lincoln was the great emancipator. His great work was giving freedom to an oppressed people. On this occasion, with the progress of our American Republic in mind, with the desire strong within us to carry forward the prosperity and the upbuilding of the country which he presided over, it is fitting for us to consider a modern phase of emancipation which confronts us of the West.

This Nation, seemingly, which Abraham Lincoln said, "was conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal, does not unhesitatingly pursue that doctrine at least under a Democratic Administration so far as the West is concerned. The Ferris bill would preserve our water-power resources, say its opponents, and for what? I would rather see one stream developed than a score preserved.

Capital Goes Elsewhere, He Says. It is estimated that Oregon has some \$300,000,000 horsepower in its streams. This far less than California has been developed, and about one-tenth, and, of course, much less actually has been developed. Yet, we are told to beware of monopoly. That often when corporations invest in Oregon, the bugaboo of monopoly is waved before us and such a connection is raised that the investor, troubled by his own conscience, takes his checkbook and his payroll and his tax money elsewhere. And in this connection, recollect that Oregon has a Public Service Commission, and excellent and adequate laws; exorbitant rates cannot be charged. Only a reasonable return upon the investment is allowed.

Today, 37 per cent of Oregon's area is timbered. That means about 42 per cent of the state pays the running expenses of the whole. And that, you will admit, is not a situation which does not excite enthusiasm in prospective taxpayers.

Settlement Is Great Need. The Government reserve of 12,470, 248 acres of forest, representing a value of \$48,000,000, or equal in value to the public lands, has been freed from the state, yields the state practically no revenue.

The principle of the forest reserve is correct, but applied when Federal lands shall be severed and such immense forest, much of which is over ripe, be harvested. After this great harvest let the agriculture and thus contribute to its share of the maintenance of our state government and the non-agricultural land be reforested as the most important water sheds of the state.

My plea to you Republicans of Oregon is to co-operate in furthering a Republican policy in the development of its resources, which effect is to smother up and the great gifts God has given us."

DRAINAGE STEP IS TAKEN

EUGENE MEETING ORGANIZES BIG RECLAMATION PROJECT.

More Than 60,000 Acres in Three Counties Are Involved—Estimates Are Heard and Plans Adopted.

EUGENE, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—The first organized step for the reclamation of between 60,000 and 70,000 acres of land in Lane, Linn and Benton counties, by the construction of a drainage system, was taken at a meeting held this afternoon in the Eugene Chamber of Commerce.

More than 100 landowners and persons interested in the plan were in attendance. It was decided to adopt the unit system in the formation of the district, and that other similar meetings should be held in the near future.

U. W. Klumaker, of Eugene, was chairman of the meeting. Dr. W. W. Hicks, of Junction City; W. D. Lingard, of Long View; and A. J. Lawrence, of Irving, acted as committee on resolutions. The resolutions declared that "it is the unanimous opinion of this meeting that an adequate drainage system should be constructed."

Simon Klovdahl, of Eugene, estimated that the cost of the project would not exceed \$4 an acre, and that the income from the project would be \$10 an acre.

Assistant State Engineer Percy A. Cooper said that he regarded this estimate as conservative. He explained the procedure which it will be necessary for the property owners to follow in the creation of the district.

The Oregon drainage district law, he said, had been patterned after the Missouri law, which had recently been upheld by the Supreme Court of the United States in every respect.

Professor W. L. Power, soil expert of the Oregon Agricultural College, assured the people of the Long Tom district that the college would co-operate in plans to get the project under way.

LENTS' FLOOD RECEDES

HOMES BEING REOCCUPIED, AND TRAFFIC IS RESUMED.

Development of Marilla in Leads Left Swampy by Lack of Drainage Is Feared.

Continued clear weather has resulted in the entire removal of further flood trouble in the Lents district. Not a few of the houses have been freed from flood waters, and occupants have begun moving back into their homes.

Some trouble is feared when the waters have entirely receded—that is, the light against malaria. The drying up of the flood waters will leave swampy lowlands in many places, and as there is not sufficient drainage, the question of sanitation is vital.

The water yesterday fell more than a foot and opened traffic on the roads that have for the past few days been practically impassable.

As a guarantee against the recurrence of a flood covering so much territory, Sheriff Hurlbert, formerly City Engineer, will suggest to the county commissioners of Lents and the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company the entire re-routing of the flooded territory so that proper drainage facilities may be provided. It is the statement of Mr. Hurlbert that such a survey would be expensive, and that it would materially lessen the dangers attending the rising of Johnson creek.

HYGIENE DISPLAY HERE

PRIZE EXHIBIT FROM SAN FRANCISCO FREE TO PUBLIC.

Educational Sex Instruction, Touching Upon Social Evil, Is Purpose of American Association.

The educational exhibit of the American Social Hygiene Association, which won a gold medal at the Panama-Pacific Exposition, is now open for inspection by Portland people at 312 Washington street, where it will remain for two or three weeks. The exhibit arrived in Portland Friday in custody of Dr. Thomas D. Elliot, who is in charge of the Pacific Coast division of the association.

The display, which was viewed by numerous crowds of visitors during the fair, consists of an elaborate series of charts, maps, models, picture albums and literature dealing with the educational, ethical, sociological and economic phases of the social hygiene movement.

Home life forms one of the fundamental divisions of the exhibit, and under this head marriage, parenthood, the family and an important phase of the social evil are touched upon.

The problem which the National Association has set out to deal with is not limited to a mere attack on immorality and the social evil, or an attempt to control and reduce certain types of dangerous diseases, or is it merely a campaign for sex instruction. It is viewed as a movement of broader scope, including all these elements as related to life perpetuation, the handing down of unblemished physical and mental inheritance from generation to generation."

In order to enable as many of the people of Portland to view the display as possible, the exhibit will be open from 10 A. M. to 10 P. M. daily. It is absolutely free. Supplementing the exhibit, supplies of literature for both sexes, young and old, will be distributed at the exhibit headquarters.

ACCUSED NOT TO APPEAR

STANLEY MCKAY TO BE TRIED WHILE FAR AWAY.

Circuit Judge Campbell Decides Justice Must Hear Charge Even If Defendant Is Not Served.

OREGON CITY, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—Attorneys for Stanley McKay today won their fight for a trial for their client without his presence in court. Justice of the Peace Campbell, overruled the demurrer argued today and overruled it.

A week ago McKay's attorney secured a writ of mandamus in the Circuit Court to compel Justice Stevens to try his client. District Attorney Hedges filed a demurrer, asserting that the Circuit Court lacked jurisdiction, and that a warrant for McKay had never been served and that therefore McKay could not be tried, that the writ contained facts insufficient to constitute a cause of action and that the writ was frivolous and vexatious.

In the complaint McKay is alleged, without cause, to have run his automobile over and seriously injured both of the occupants of the buggy.

The real reason why McKay has so earnestly dodged the local officials is said to be to avoid a suit for damages threatened by the two persons injured. Costs in the case are several times the highest possible fine.

GO-ED HAS WILD RIDE

GIRL CLINGS TO UPSET CANOE FOR 1200 FEET IN RAPIDS. Escort Runs Along Bank Trying to Catch Up, but She Is Rescued at University Boat-house.

Attendants at the boat-house, opposite the university, rescued Miss Cowan as the canoe passed that point.
