

73 TURN OUT FOR TRACK AT OREGON

Hayward Will Build Team Up Around Chet Fee and Martin Nelson.

YOUNG HOPEFULS RETURN

Large Class of Freshmen Is Well Represented Among Candidates and Will Receive Equal Attention in Training.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 12.—(Special)—Seventy-three students this week responded to the call of "Bill" Hayward and have signed up for events in track. With four days of preliminary work now finished, in which more than half of the men have become limbered up to a certain extent, Hayward's problem—the building of a new track team for 1916—has commenced.

Confronted by a heavy schedule of events for the season, with only two letter men from last year's squad on hand, the new candidates have been responsive to the demand for additional members and the Oregon trainer is pleased.

The number of freshmen who will try to show themselves and get into line for next year in large. Thirty-one are actor positions.

Freshmen to Get Training, Too. Because the first year men are barred from intercollegiate contests this season, they are to receive no setbacks in their training for "Bill" will coach them along with the regular varsity squad.

Although the freshman class is exceedingly well represented among the candidates, only few have had any experience.

Chet Fee and Martin Nelson, the only letter men from 1915, will form the nucleus around which the team is to be built. Fee, with no high school record, has developed rapidly while in college training, and scored high in all track meets of the last season. Nelson failed to get a start last year, but is a steady man, never willing to give up, upon whom Hayward relies.

Three Return for Sports. In the sprinters are three men who made splash last season. Walter Peacock reduced his time during the latter part of the practice, and Peacock must show himself this year. Hayward declares this sprinter has a bright future, if he will work.

Keat Wilson, a sophomore, formerly of Washington High, is a dependable sprinter, who has just returned to college. Others in the sprint column are: Howard Bowles, of Wasco High School; George Davis, of Washington High; M. V. Nelson, a freshman from Redmond; High Goresky, of Portland; and Paul Smith, a freshman from Lincoln High School.

Martin Nelson is again trying for the 440 and 880-yard runs. Along with him are Ray Stuck, formerly of Washington High School; Clarence Brunkow, of Portland; E. J. Howard, of Grants Pass High School; and Joe Meener, of Eugene.

Grants Pass Boy Is Out. Ben Baiding, a sophomore from Grants Pass, is in the race to compete in the 440 and 880-yard runs. Baiding is a sprinter, who has just returned to college. He is a steady man, never willing to give up, upon whom Hayward relies.

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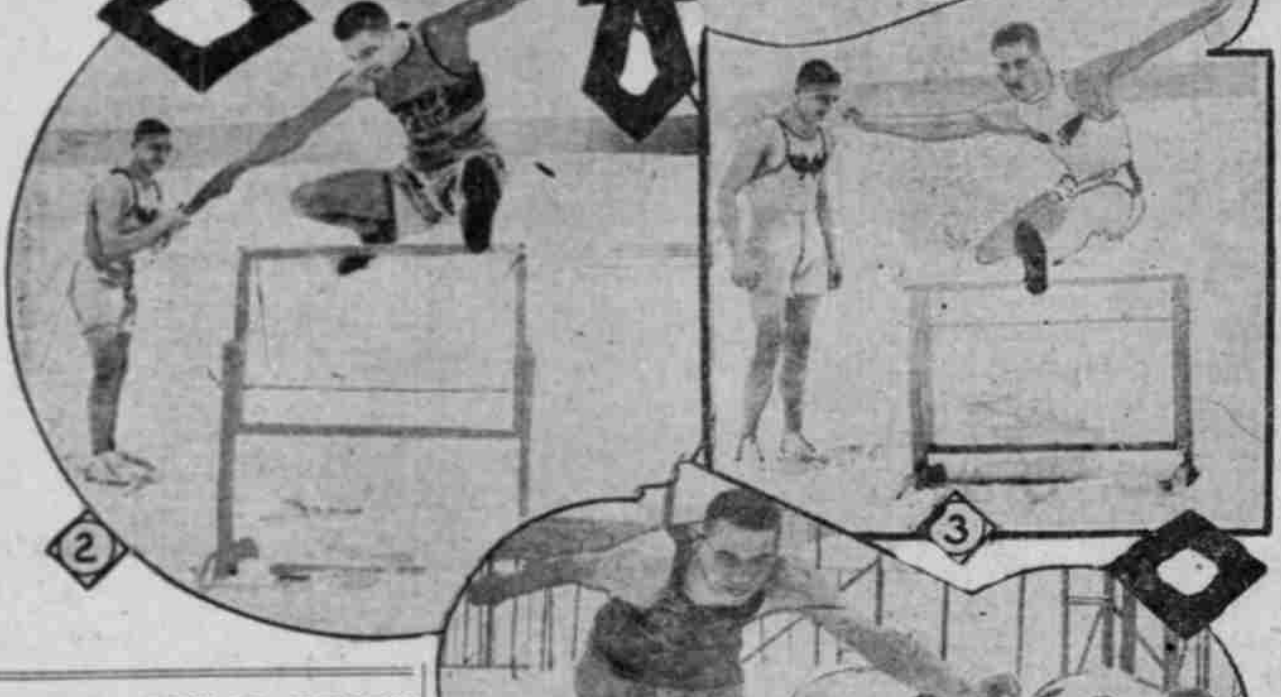

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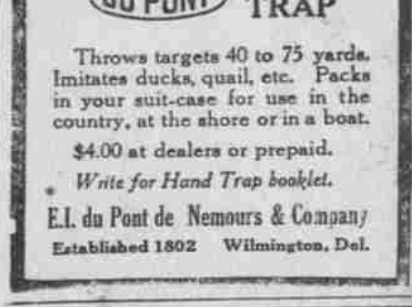
