that the white race was trying to take their country away from the mailves. The rebellion was quelled when, December 18, the United States shout cruiser Chester arrived off Greenville with 196 native soldiers on board from the garrisen at Monrovia.

Miss Suckey, with other American missionaries, was taken aboard the sheater and transported to Mourovia. The Liberian troops soon cleared the district of hostile natives.

Deciding to devote himself to writing, he went to New York City at the age of 18. For a time he met with little encouragement. A pear later he went to Hoston and soon become well known as the author of stories and sketches under the pen name of "Paul Creyton."

His first book, "Father Brighthopes." was published in 1833, and his first genuine success was "Neighbor Jackwood," a novel of New England life, which appeared in 1855. For some time he edited "Our Young Folka," which numbered among its contributors Dickens, Whittier, Mayne Reid, Mrz. Stowe and Miss Alcott.

Perhaps the best known of Mr. Trowbridge's verse is the humorous poem. "Darius Green and His Flying Machine," written in 1870. When, 40 years later, he first saw an acroplane in action, he remarked:

"I never dreamed when I wrote that poem that such a thing as a flying machine was even a possibility in my lifetime."

Among his books for boys the most popular were "Cudjo's Cave" and "The Three Scouts."
