## 19 COAST ATHLETES HOLD WORLD TITLES

Book of Records and Statistics Is Published by Pacific Amateur Union.

### ALL SPORT IS INCLUDED

Figures for First College Baseball Game on Coast, Between St. Mary's and Santa Clara in 1873, Are Given.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 18.—That 19 Pacific Coast athletes are the holders of world's records is brought out in a book of Pacific Coast records which has just been compiled and published by William Unmack, of San Francisco, chairman of the records committee of the Pacific Association of the Amateur Athletic Union. They are:

Tennis—William Johnston and Clarence J. Griffin.

Swimming—Lady Langer, Duke Kahana-moku and George Cunn.

Track—Fred Murray, George Parker, Dan Kelly, Haines by, Forrest Smithson, Fred Kelly, E. Heeson, Howard Drew and Patrick Donovan.

Cycling—Blans Ohrt.

Shooting—G. Armstrong, J. E. Gorman, M. C. Laughlin and W. F. Blasse.

The book includes complete records of past performances made by Pacific Coast athletes and teams, both amateur and professional, in all branches of sport, including baseball, yachting, motorboat racing, tennis, basketball, American football, rugby football, association football, cricket, boxing, cycling, trotting and pacing, bowling, billiards and pool, golf, rowing and revolver and rifle shooting. All kinds of statistics are included.

Baseball Statistics Given.

Among these it is shown that Stockton defeated Lodi in 1902 in the longest game of baseball played on the coast. It went 25 innings and resulted in a 2-to-1 score. Ping Bodie, of the San Francisco Pacific Coast League, is credited with the greatest number of home runs scored in a season. The greatest number of strikeouts in one game is accorded to Charlie Shields, of Seattle, in a game against Portland, when he retired 19 men on July 8, 1905, at Portland.

The first college baseball game on the coast was played between the teams of St. Mary's and Santa Clara in 1872 and was played at San Mateo and won by the former club by a score of 10 to 4. The trotting and pacing statistics were compiled by William Neal and include the fastest performers of each gait and sex bred in the coast states, including Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Spokane Holds Early Records.

A fact believed to be little known is shown in the cycling records. There are a number of Spokane men who still retain records which they made as far back as 1899 and earlier.

A brief history of the coast, together with a list of the Pacific Coast champions, is compiled by Jack Neville, the present coast champion.

Tennis is handled by John C. Rohlf, secretary of the Pacific State Tennis Association, and includes coast, state and college champions, together with brief biographies of coast stars who have earned international reputations.

Swimming Races Included.

Coast rowing takes in the intercollegiate and club champions in four and eight-oared shells and barges since its inception.

The achievements of swimmers around the Bear River, the Golden Gate, San Francisco Bay, Seattle Harbor, the Willamette River, the Panama Canal, Honolulu and other points are included in which the volume is considered the most complete ever published. Photographs of the champions in each department are used to head the various chapters. The book will be published annually.

## TRAPPING FOUND CRUEL

UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR TELLS OF ANIMALS' STRUGGLES.

Emaciated Beasts Often Gnaw Off Own Legs in Order to Escape—Majority Die Fighting.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, March 18.—Professional trapping in the mountains of Oregon is accompanied by many pitiful cruelties, according to A. C. Shelton, field worker in the department of zoology of the State University, who has visited many a line of traps in his travels in the Cascades and elsewhere, and in his own trapping for the University's dissecting work and museum.

Pine squirrels, flying squirrels and rabbits frequently get caught in traps set for fur-bearing animals. The squirrels are usually eaten by foxes before the trapper gets around. Mr. Shelton has found dead rabbits held to the traps merely by pieces of skin, showing how desperate had been their struggles to escape.

Mink and marten often cut themselves loose by gnawing off their legs. On the South Fork of the McKenzie River Mr. Shelton found a coyote's leg, eaten off just below the shoulder, in a trap. Three weeks later the same animal was found in another trap, caught by its other front leg.

A wildcat in a "toggle" trap has to stay until its captor makes leisurely arrival. The "toggle" is set in a pen. A fir limb with part of the branches cut is fastened to the trap, and as the animal tries to crawl away the branches get fast and hold it.

The spring pole trap makes death a little easier. A snail is bent down and fastened lightly over a log. The captured animal is swung up into the air when the fastening breaks and then cannot bite itself free. Death comes more quickly than on the ground.

Yale Swimmers Lead League.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 18.—Yale went into first place in the intercollegiate Swimming League here last night by defeating Columbia, 39 to 14. The feature was Yale's victory in the 600-foot relay race.
