WEST SIDE TO CARE FOR TOTS IN PARADE

Entertainment of Participants in Big Rose Festival Event Is Being Prepared.

The children's parade in the Rose Festival this year will be held on the West Side as the opening-day feature of the Festival, on June 7, instead of on the East Side, where it has been the special Festival feature for many sea-

The change from the East to the West Side of the Willamette River was announced in the tentative programme of the Festival, and at a special meeting held to consider requests to keep this pageant on the East Side the Festival board voted to present the spectacle in the business district of the West Side.

One of the main reasons for the change has been the publicity to be derived for Portland as a result of the photographs, both in motion pictures and newspaper and magazine advertising. With the parade on the West Side, Portland's business district will be shown to fine advantage in the exploitation of the June Show following the close of the enterprise.

In a statement issued yesterday from Festival headquarters it was announced that the parade will be featured on the West Side the morning of June 7 at 9:45 o'clock. The line of march will ecover the same distance as on the East Side, and the pageant will pass the Courthouse, City Hall, theaters, hotels and many stores and office buildings.

It is the belief of the Festival management that, inasmuch as thousands of people on the West Side have never seen this feature of the Festival, the change should be made. After investigation it was found there were fully 50,000 people in Portland, many residents of the East Side working in the business district, had never seen this parade. Same Distance to Be Traversed.

Under the law now in effect, the second half is not due and payable until October 5, regardless of whether the first half was paid by April 5. Prior to October 6, the date of tax delinquency, the two halves represent distinct obligations.
