She spoke of its wonderful art, particularly as embodied in the works of the greatest novellst, not only of the 18th century, but of all time. Speaking of the seriousness of Russian literature, she referred particularly to the works of Turgeney. Tolstoi, Doestolevsky and Andreev.

"It seemed wonderful," she said, "that Russia, which we have considered the most kopeless in point of civilization, should have struck the highest note of hopefulness for the future."

She referred to two notable qualities of Russian genius, their sympathy and pity for mankind, even the most degraded. She spoke also of the idealism
