WASHINGTON'S HOPE IS LOW Track Team Works Hard to Make Good Showing Against Oregon.

UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON, Seattle, May 13.—(Special).—Prospects for a winning track team are so poor that Coach Vander Veer is using his crack sprinter, Stenstrom, on the low hurdles in an attempt to double up and make creditable showing when the team goes to Eugene, May 20, to compete with the University of Oregon.

Stenstrom is coming along well in the sprints, and from now on will probably carry the brunt of the work in the low hurdles. He and Capt. Clyson, who runs the mile, are regarded as stars in their events, although there is a possibility that both may lose to Oregon. Clyde has won consistently during his track career here, and Stenstrom had no trouble with the dashes last year.

Washington will be weak in the weights, javelin and jumps. She will be fairly well represented in the half mile and quarter and in the 220-yard dash. Neither Stuebel nor Huriburt has yet reached 12 feet in the pole vault, and this will not put them above second place in a meet with Oregon unless the dope is badly upset.

The team would have brighter prospects if the freshmen were allowed to compete in intercollegiate athletics. Howe, in the quarter and century dash, and Sinclair, in the sprints, would add materially to the strength of the team.

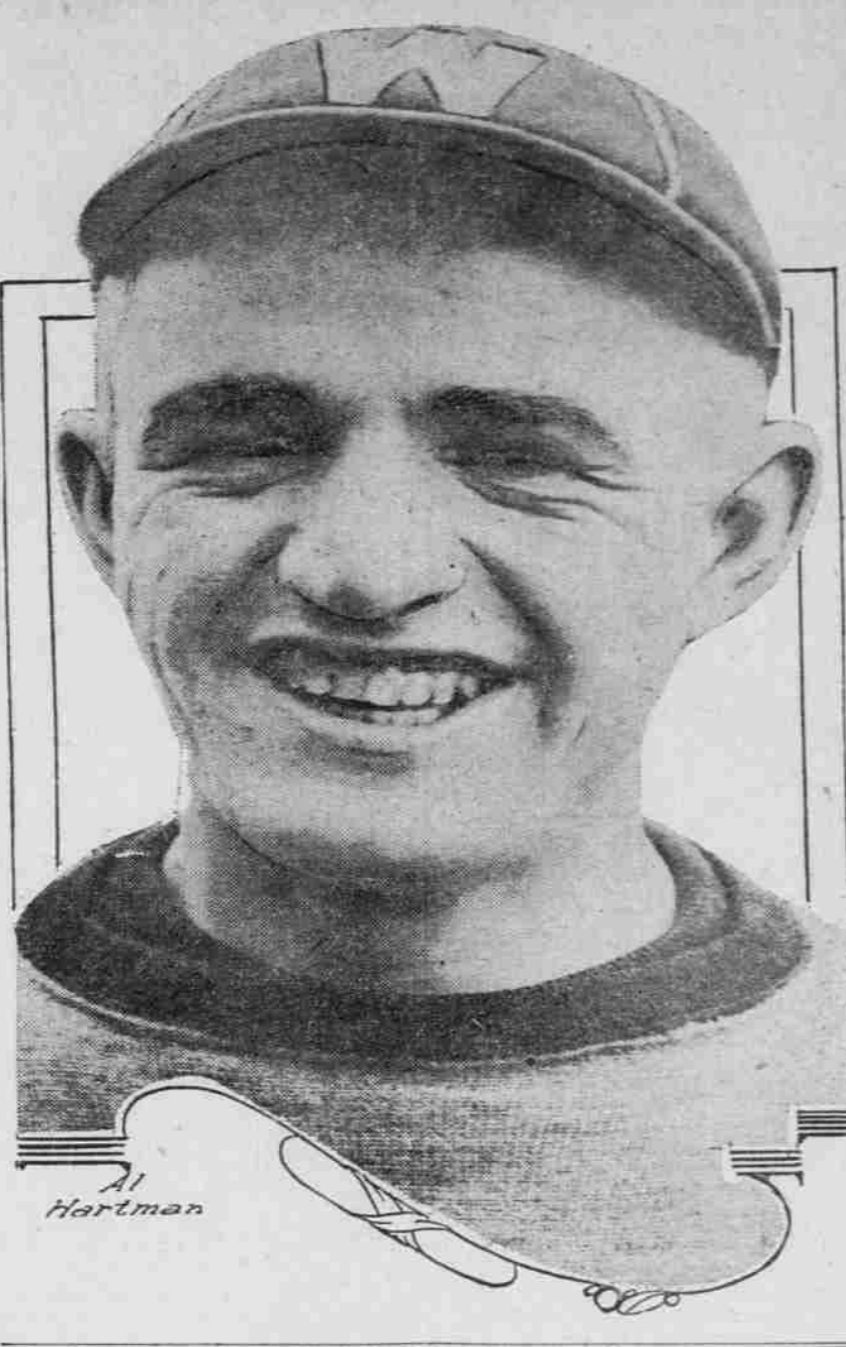
BOOTS AT BOISE GET SETBACK Sommers and Evans Delay Departure From Portland.

Hartman and Alexander Will Join Beavers.

PULLMAN BOY IS MARVEL

Hartman Wins One Game From Idaho, Striking Out 13 and Allowing Only Two Swats, but Errors in Support Cost Shutout.

When the Portland Beavers return home from the road trip June 6, which they will start tonight, there will be a dandy little college southpaw waiting for them. He is likely to pitch in one of the games against Oakland. His name is Al Hartman and he is the star pitcher of the Washington State College nine.

Hartman's last game was pitched last Friday against the University of Idaho at Moscow. Pullman won the game, 5 to 1. Al struck out 13 batters and allowed only two hits. He had allowed no hits and no runs up until the seventh. With the score tied, 1 to 1, in the ninth, Hartman came to bat and with a two-bagger started a rally which netted four runs.

In two different innings he struck out three men in a row, and once this transpired with two on the bases and the head of the batting order up. Errors behind this midget cost him a shutout. He has not lost a game since pitching for his school.

Here is Alexander's feat of last Friday. He defeated the Idaho Technical Institute, 9 to 0, striking out 20 batters and making four hits himself. This game decided the collegiate championship of Southern Idaho for his school.

Both of these phenoms were unattached and signed for the Beavers by James J. Richardson, scout for the Beavers.
