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MRS. C. E. WATTS BURIED

WOMAN WHO CAME TO OREGON IN 1845 IS LAID TO REST. Thimble Is Placed Upon Finger In Accordance to Request of Woman. Noted for Her Needlework.

NEWBERG, Ore., May 20. (Special.)—Mrs. Caroline E. Watts, widow of John W. Watts, was buried at Lafayette this week. She was one of the five "Bayley girls" who were brought across the plains in 1845 by their father, D. D. Bailey, and settled in the Chehalam Valley.

At the time of her death, Mrs. Watts was 89 years old. She was the first of the five sisters to die. The husbands of all of the sisters died several years ago.

The grandfather of Mrs. Watts was Captain Timothy Bayley, who served during the entire seven years of the Revolutionary War. He was at Valley Forge and was present at Yorktown when Cornwallis surrendered.
