

HUGHES' MAJORITY IN STATE 17,000

Republican Vote Is 100,000; Cimmins Loses by 24,246 Burton Gets 9129.

WILSON VOTE IS SOLID

Roosevelt Gets Enough Backing to Nominate Him; Ed Wright Is Ahead in Eastern Oregon. Buchtel Is Nominated.

(Continued From First Page.) Campbell 14,707. But when the Multnomah returns are added the result stands so far as counted Buchtel, 35,998; Campbell, 23,527. Buchtel's present lead, 12,471.

In the Eastern Oregon district the winner in the Public Service Commission contest is in doubt. Corey and Wright have substantial leads over their competitors, but the incomplete returns give Corey a lead over Wright of only \$1 votes.

The figures follow: Corey, 2888; Wright, 2695; McCulloch, 2965; Kyle, 1859; Ruak, 1886; Service, 1751.

Particular interest attaches to the Eastern Oregon nomination because the successful candidate in that district will be appointed by Governor Withycombe to fill the unexpired term of Clyde B. Atchison, who has resigned from the commission to become a solicitor for the Association of State Railway Commissioners.

W. C. Hawley and N. J. Sinnott have been nominated in the First and Second Congressional District to succeed themselves as Representatives in Congress.

It is probable that Mr. Sinnott has received the Democratic nomination also in his district. In the First District Democrats have written in the name of Mark V. Weatherford, of Albany.

Delegates-at-Large Uncertain.

The contest for delegates-at-large to the Republican National convention is yet undecided. It is apparent, however, that ex-Senator G. W. Fulton, George J. Cameron, of Portland, and Charles H. Carey and Daniel Boyd, of Enterprise, have been selected. Arthur C. Spencer, who in Multnomah County ran about even with Mr. Carey, fell off greatly in the state at large. Russell Hawkins, on the contrary, ran strong up state and weak in Portland in comparison with the others. The following are the figures on the incomplete returns:

Fulton, 38,758; Cameron, 27,565; Carey, 26,283; Boyd, 32,704; Spencer, 26,762; Hawkins, 26,322; Ackerson, 19,072; Buland, 15,547; Peterson, 15,894; Worsley, 15,298.

For Presidential electors on the Republican ticket the partial returns indicate that the following five have been elected out of a field of seven: W. C. North, W. I. Cottell, R. R. Butler, J. F. Wilson, W. P. Keady. The vote stands as follows:

North, 47,168; Cottell, 46,187; Butler, 49,521; Wilson, 43,926; Keady, 38,410; MacMahon, 35,493; Ivanhoe, 26,911.

Judge Bennett Is Leading.

Judge S. Bennett, of The Dalles, is leading in the contest for delegate to the Democratic National convention from the state at large. Incomplete returns from 20 of the most populous counties of the state outside of Multnomah County give him an aggregate of 6002 votes.

Thomas H. Crawford, of Union County, is second, with 5972; Frank L. Armitage, of Lane County, third, with 5128, and W. L. Morgan, of Multnomah County, fourth, with 4468. The returns from Multnomah County may change the relative standing of these candidates.

C. C. Jackson, of Linn County, and R. R. Turner, of Douglas County, are in the lead for election as delegates to the St. Louis convention from the First Congressional District.

A close race has developed in the Eastern Oregon district and the contestants for Democratic delegate, Will M. Peterson, of Umatilla County, is in the lead, with 2198 votes; Will R. King, of Malheur, is second, with 2023, and Fred J. Holmes, of Union, is third, with 2010. The race lies between these three. Two are to be elected.

The Oregon Republican vote for Vice-President went to a person named William Grant Webster, who had his name placed on the ballot by paying the required fee. Inasmuch as his name was the only one on the ballot, the Republicans made him their nominal choice.

It is reported, however, that the name of Senator Borah, of Idaho, was written in for Vice-President in many counties, particularly in Multnomah. The Borah movement did not get

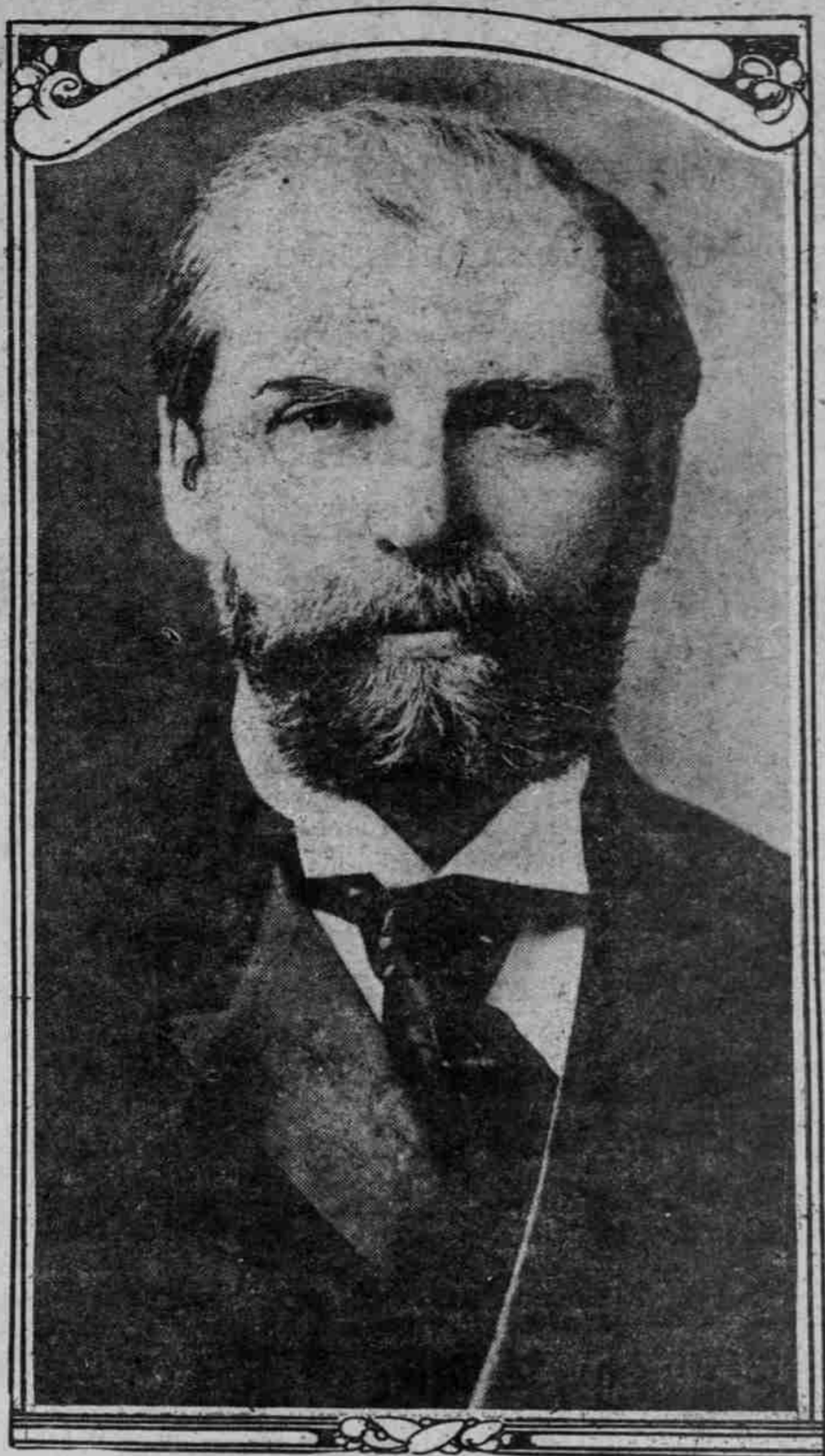

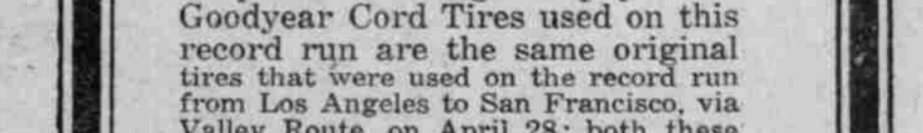
