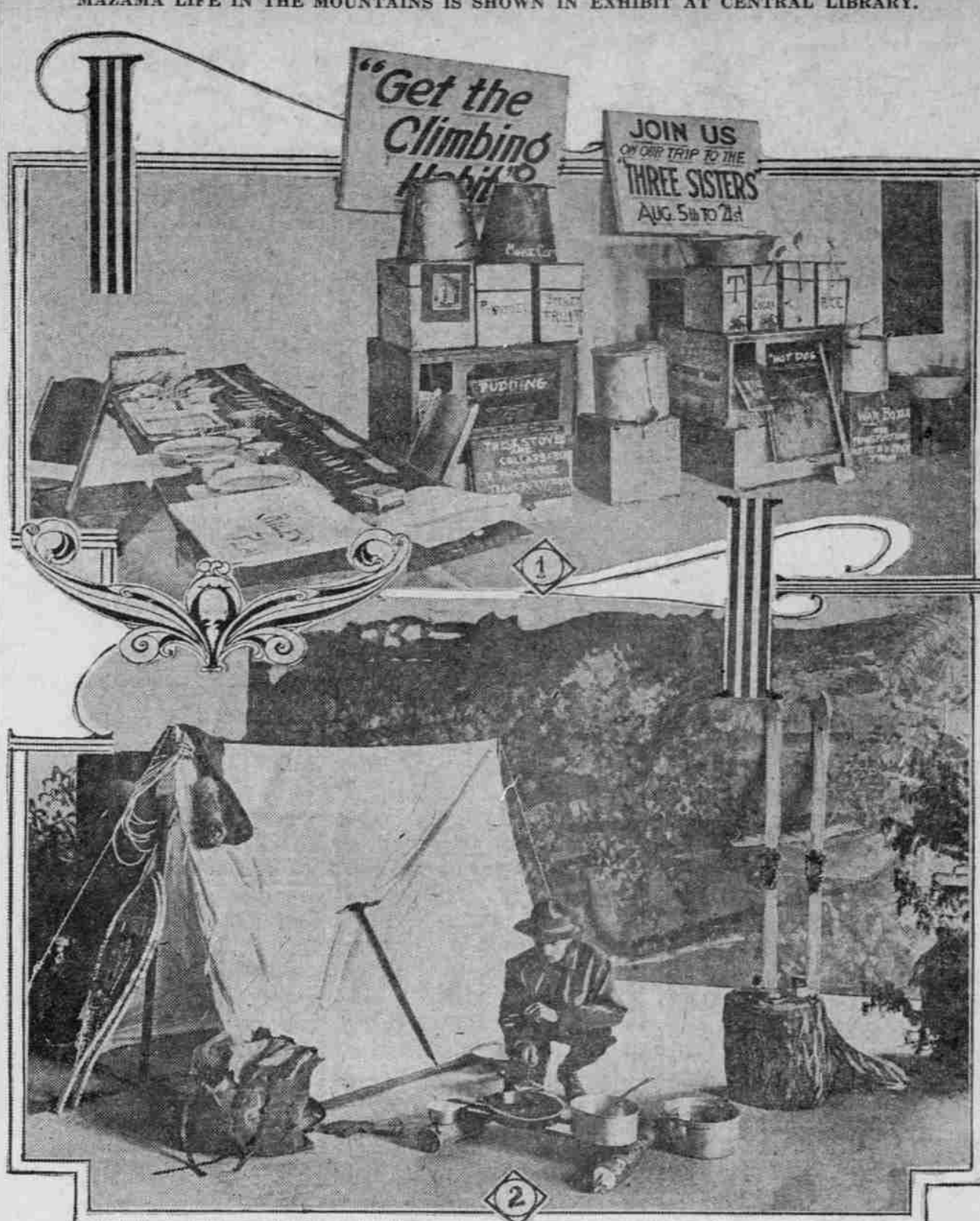

Secrets of Getting Greatest Comfort Out of Hiking Trips Demonstrated.

FOOD SUPPLIES SUGGESTED

Best Styles of Clothing to Wear, Sleeping and Other Equipment and Advantageous Ways of Using Same Emphasized.

Secrets of good hiking and the joys of scenery in the mountains as experienced by the Mazama club members in their exhibit that opened Friday night at the Central Library.

The display room is transformed into a veritable mountain camp, with the tents and camp equipment. In one corner forked sticks are set up and a make-believe fire is underneath.

The most interesting feature is the commissary department, with collapsible stoves and ovens, with cooking utensils labeled with the names of food they should contain.

Tents are pitched and blankets spread and rolled to illustrate manners of packing and sleeping, and the best advantage to which articles of protection may be put.

The women members, who have invented comfortable and suitable clothing for hard trips, have displays of their costumes.

Another natty hiking garb is of Army cloth, Norfolk style, with knickerbockers and a wide, warm sash.

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G. M. M'BRIDE WILL RUN INDEPENDENTLY

Prominent Attorney Yields to Demand of Friends to Oppose George Tazwell.

FAMILY ONE OF PIONEERS

Father Is Justice McBride and Own Record Is Remarkable as Legislator—Campaign Is to Be Made for County Judge.

BISHOP HUGHES IS ACTOR

METHODIST LEADER APPEARS FOR FIRST TIME IN PAGEANT.

History of Denomination Is Traced From John Wesley to Present Day, Showing Growth.

Bishop Mathew Simpson Hughes made his first appearance in Portland, Ore., in the pageant of the district at the Pageant of Methodism at Lincoln High School last night.

"I am glad to have had the opportunity to make my initial appearance with the young people," said Bishop Hughes.

The pageant traced the Methodist Church from the time that John Wesley's mother dedicated him to the work of ministry.

The founding of Methodism in America by Philip Embury, on the advice of Bishop of the Episcopal church, the birth of the Sunday school, the work of missionaries and finally the present condition of the church.

The pageant was given by the young people of the various Methodist Epworth Leagues of Portland.

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George M. McBride, Who Will Be Independent Candidate for County Judge.

George M. McBride, who has announced that he will be an independent candidate for County Judge in response to a widespread feeling that George Tazwell, the Republican nominee, is

hardly fitted for the place, is an able young attorney of Portland.

Mr. McBride belongs to a pioneer Oregon family, many members of which have become distinguished in the public service.

His father, Judge T. A. McBride, is now serving his second term on the Oregon supreme bench.

Prior to becoming a Supreme Court Justice he was a Circuit Judge for nearly 20 years.

An uncle, the late George W. McBride, was United States Senator from Oregon. Another uncle, the late John R. McBride, was a member of the Oregon constitutional convention, and the first Representative in Congress from this state.

Mr. McBride himself was elected State Senator from Multnomah, Columbia and Clackamas counties two years ago by a majority of 20,000 votes.

His majority in Multnomah County was 13,000 votes.

For several weeks he has been urged by friends to enter the race for County Judge against Mr. Tazwell.

Mr. McBride was very conservative in regard to passing new laws. He took the attitude that so far as possible old laws should be simplified and that only such new laws should be passed as were really needed.

The Senate revision of laws committee, of which he is chairman, reported to the Senate on 62 bills which had been referred to it. In every instance, the recommendation of the committee was followed by the Senate, a most unusual record.

Winlock Enrollment Grows.

CENTRALIA, Wash., June 17.—(Special.)—The total enrollment of the Winlock school for the year just closed was 434, according to a report just submitted to County Superintendent Canterbury.

This is a substantial increase over the preceding year. The high school enrollment was 62, a gain of nine over the previous year.
