

HUGHES IS SILENT BUT IS SATISFIED

Conference With Root Is Described by Candidate as "Very Pleasant."

DELAY SEEMS TO CHAFE

Republican Nominee Exudes Confidence and Is Getting Ready for a Whirlwind Campaign Throughout Country.

NEW YORK, June 24.—(Special).—The man whom Theodore Roosevelt will heartily endorse on Monday for President, the man who is drawing to himself Progressives from "irreconcilable" Western states and "old-guard" leaders from the granite East, stood in a little red-and-gold room at the Hotel Astor and smiled affectionately at a semi-circle of newspaper men today. These newspaper men, 12 of them at least, had been waiting two hours while ex-Senator Elihu Root told the Republican candidate for President what he thought about the campaign.

When the 12 were admitted to the little red-and-gold room with pencils all sharpened to write what Mr. Root had said to Mr. Hughes, they were met with the above-mentioned affectionate smile and the words, "Well, boys, it's the same old story—nothing to say."

Conference "Very Pleasant."

Somebody with an extra sharp pencil stepped forward. "Will you tell us whether Mr. Root offered you his whole-hearted support?"

Mr. Hughes hesitated, then he made a long speech as follows:

"Least my silence be misinterpreted, I will say this: The conference was very pleasant."

This was the most definite remark made by Mr. Hughes at any time during the interview. He stood there for ten minutes, while the reporters asked him all sorts of improper things, and in the end the reporters had acquired a number of facts for their own information, and nothing at all for print.

But those who had joined the semi-circles for the first time must have taken away with them something at most as valuable as a "story." It was the mental picture of a man now wrestling with one of the critical phases of his campaign, enduring the confusion and responsibility of a big enterprise not yet organized, "seeing people" all day straight through the luncheon hour, directing a strategy to attract the outraged Progressives, incidentally winning an acceptance speech and never losing his smile.

Smile to His Smile.

This smile, by the way, is Mr. Hughes' big facial asset though it hasn't yet acquired comic paper fame. Like Mr. Roosevelt's smile, it is simple and unrestrained and like it, too, it displays a full set of healthy teeth. Is it proper to speak of a candidate's teeth in the early days of a campaign? However this may be, the Hughes teeth are going to be known to all the world before November and so is the Hughes mustache, which looks even huskier than the photographs show it. It is really a military mustache of the old school, being down beside his mouth and merging with his closely cropped beard.

Then there is the Hughes nose, with its pleasant touch of the Roman, and his eyes, twinkling blue eyes, looking just a little strained and tired, and his interesting eyebrows, interesting because at their inner ends they have that bushy twist which denotes a fiery temper; in fact, Mr. Hughes' eyebrows, even when he laughs retain a downward curve, just as though they insisted on frowning.

His face, though basically ruddy, is a little gray just now from sleeplessness, perhaps, or midnight dictation.

Delay Seems to Bother Candidate.

The man's whole figure, as he stood gracefully saying nothing to the newspapermen, expressed vitality, alertness, lightning wit and humor and above all, eagerness to be "up and at 'em." There is no doubt Mr. Hughes chafes at the delay that attends settling matters with the Progressives and being notified in the old formal way. Mr. Hughes doesn't like it any better than the reporters that he must seal his lips on National issues now when Fifth avenue has burst out in flags and the boys in khaki are marching by, but when he does speak, look out! He toots, "said one of his close friends, "he was going to leave no stone unturned."

"What does that mean?"

"It means that he is going to clean up this country as it has never been done before. He is going to visit every state and give 'em speeches such as will make his speeches for Taft seem like thin, faded stuff. He will bet. Confident? Yes, Hughes is confident. He will not overlook a single bit. Confident? Yes, Hughes is confident. But he will clinch this thing and rivet it down before he will be satisfied."

What makes it all the harder for Mr. Hughes just now is that he has no experienced, tried, and proven agent, no National chairman (this will come next week), almost, indeed, nobody to lick envelopes. He is badly overworked. But in a little while he will emerge from this chaos and when the West sees him it will see no cold, grave figure in a black robe, but a man at once alert, composed, fiery and urbane. He will look bigger as the summer advances.

HUGHES STRONG IN EAST

DELEGATE FROM CHERALIS IS ENTHUSIASTIC OVER PROSPECTS.

N. B. Coffman Returns From Chicago With Report That Progressives Generally Are Pleased.

CHERALIS, Wash., June 24.—(Special).—N. B. Coffman has returned from Chicago, where he went as a delegate to the Republican National Convention. He is enthusiastic over the work of the Republican convention and the nomination of Charles E. Hughes.

Mr. Coffman says that in the East the sentiment is strong for Hughes, and that in his judgment the Progressive party as an organization will distinguish itself by its loyalty to the Progressive party, although they were strong Roosevelt men at first.

LANE BILL UP SOON

Action on Hawley's Naval Base Measure Promised.

\$3,000,000 GRANT ASKED

So Far No Effort Has Been Made to Amend Naval Appropriation Bill by Senators; Mr. Hawley Will Urge Separate Action.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 24.—(Special).—Through the efforts of Senator Lane, the Senate committee on naval affairs today agreed to give a hearing next Tuesday on the Lane bill authorizing the establishment of a naval base on the Columbia River and appropriating \$3,000,000 to begin construction. Representative Hawley has been assured that a hearing on his bill identical with the Lane bill will be given by the House committee the latter part of next week.

P. C. Hawley, chairman of the naval base committee, will appear before both committees and present arguments in support of the naval base bill and will urge its incorporation as an amendment in the naval appropriation bill. Senator Lane said he would invite all members of the Oregon congressional delegation to attend and participate in the hearing on Tuesday, and all those appearing before the Senate committee will be invited by Mr. Hawley to appear before the House committee later in the week.

Naval Bill Not Touched.

Up to the present time no effort has been made by the Oregon Senators to obtain an authorization in the naval appropriation bill for a naval base of any character on the Columbia River. Neither Senator Chamberlain nor Senator Lane appeared before the subcommittee in behalf of this project while the subcommittee was redrafting and enlarging the naval bill passed by the House. Nor, up to this time, has either Senator offered a Columbia River base amendment to the naval bill.

Senator Chamberlain said some days ago he would offer an amendment providing for the establishment of a submarine base on the Columbia River, but he has not yet done so. Senator Lane today said he had not decided whether he would offer his bill as an amendment to the naval appropriation bill, saying his course would depend upon what takes place at the hearing on Tuesday.

Separate Measure Proposed.

The expectation now is that the naval appropriation bill will be reported to the Senate after the hearing on the Columbia River base, and if no provision for that base is made in the regular bill Mr. Hawley will urge that the Lane-Hawley bill be pressed in both bodies as a separate measure.

Before reporting to the full committee today, the Senate subcommittee amended that provision of the House bill authorizing an investigation and report on the need and on sites for naval bases on the two coasts, by requiring also an investigation of the needs and sites for submarine bases as well as full Navy yards.

Two sisters, Mrs. Jennie Bingham and Mrs. Julia Cross, of Oregon City, Or., and a brother, John Straight, who also lives in Oregon, survive.

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ADMEN MEET TODAY

Associated Advertising Clubs Convene in Philadelphia.

8000 DELEGATES PRESENT

Programme Divided Into 30 Departments Whose Sessions Will Continue Four Days—Elaborate Entertainment Provided.

PHILADELPHIA, June 24.—Between 8000 and 10,000 delegates are gathered here tonight for the opening tomorrow of the convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, at which purveyors of nearly a billion dollars a year in advertising will exchange ideas in business and salesmanship.

The programme for the convention has been divided into 30 departments, whose sessions will continue for four days. Various buildings of the University of Pennsylvania have been reserved for these departmental meetings and, in addition, there will be two mass meetings for all the delegates in the commercial museum. The first of these, tomorrow afternoon, will be addressed by Adolph S. Ochs, of the New York Times; Cyrus H. K. Curtis, of the Curtis Publishing Company, Philadelphia; R. Goodwin Rhett, president of the National Chamber of Commerce, and N. C. Kingsbury, vice-president of the Postal Telegraph Company.

Thursday afternoon the second mass meeting will be held, when the delegates will sum up the work of the convention. At this session officers will be elected and the city for next year's convention will be chosen.

Gathering Is Important.

Elaborate preparations have been made for the convention, which leading delegates say will rank as the most important gathering of its kind in the history of the world. Since early last fall an organized campaign of publicity has been carried on throughout the country, more than \$500,000 having been spent in newspaper and magazine advertising, billboards, placards and posters calling attention to the session.

While this campaign of National publicity was going on the Poor Richard Club kept the convention before the Philadelphia public. Business men of the city contributed \$25,000 to the convention fund, while the city appropriated \$25,000 more for the entertainment of the delegates.

The first will be held Monday night in the form of a monster parade on Broad street, in which floats representing various periods of the country's development will be seen. One division will illustrate the history of advertising in America. In this will appear "Benjamin Franklin," printing his Pennsylvania Gazette. The Baldwin Locomotive Works will have in line two locomotives, one, "Old Ironsides," built in 1822 by Mathias Baldwin, and the other the latest type turned out of the factory. The J. G. Brill Car Works will show a miniature plant turning out a tiny trolley car every few minutes.

Tuesday night a military and naval display will be staged on Franklin Field and on Thursday night a pageant will be held on the Schuylkill River with a procession of floats and a big display of fireworks.

The delegates will visit the Philadelphia Navy-Yard on Tuesday afternoon for the first public inspection of the new dreadnought Pennsylvania recently completed at Newport News. The advertising men will be the first visitors to go aboard the new man-o-war.

Many women accompanied the visitors who arrived today, and a programme of entertainment is provided for them.

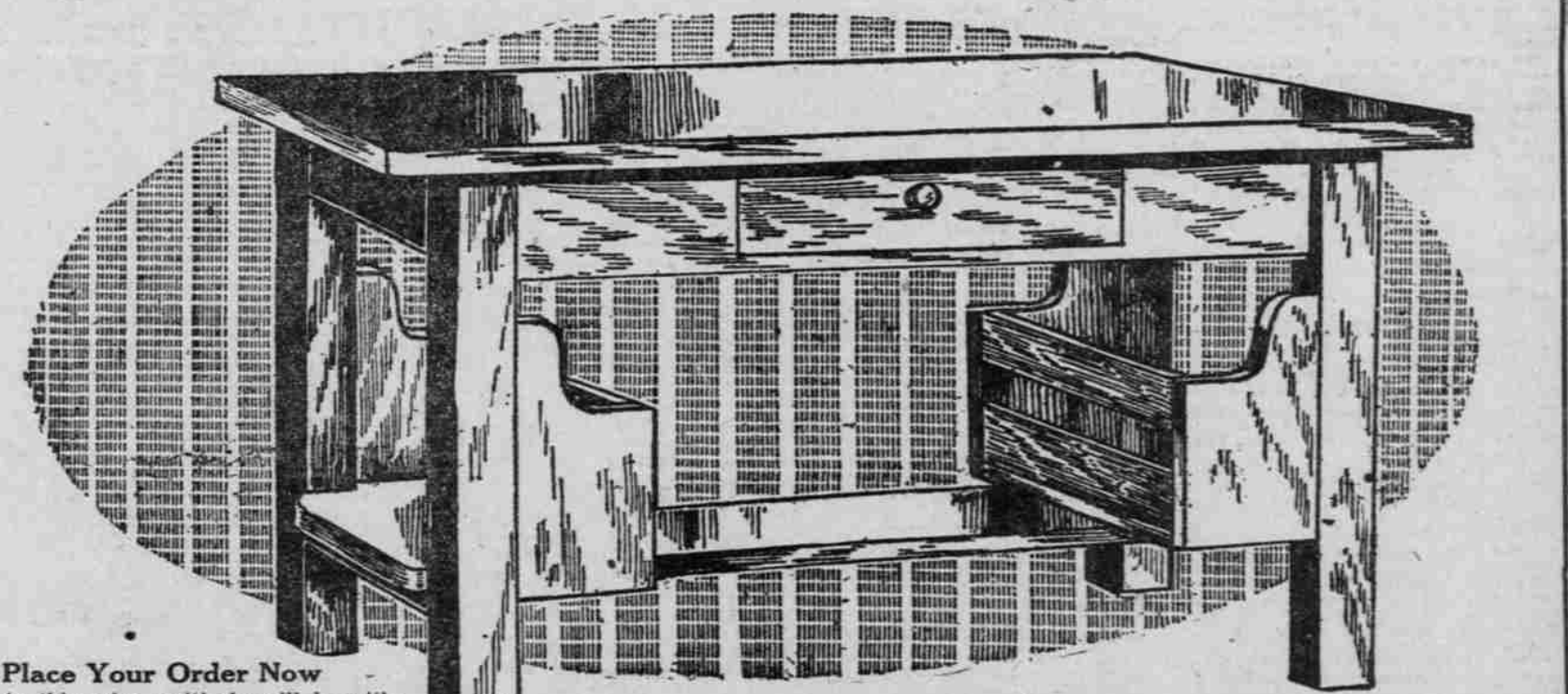
