It is about the size of the American half dollar and bears upon its face the legend "Carolus III. Del Gratia-1784."

On the obverse is the royal coat of arms encircled by the words "Rex-Imperator-Hispanola et Ind." It is patent from the inscription that the coin belongs to the reign of Charles III, King and Emperor of Spain and the Indies from the year 1759 to the do country. year 1788. RANTS PASS, Or., July 8-(Spe-jers into the Southern Oregon country. The first was a tiny gold crucifix which was found among a quantity of gold nuggets taken from the sluices of the Logan mine in the early '50s and with the first invasion of the white man into Josephine County. About the same time some ancient tunnels which had filled with wash clay and gravel were discovered far below the surface levels in the wall of the gravel bank, which proved beyond any doubt from the age and nature of the deposits that the ground had been mined 50 to 150 years before the operations of the early 750s. Some 14 years ago James Logan, the present owner of the mines, in com-pany with his father-in-law, in the course of placer mining discovered, greatly blackened by time and corroded by placer wash, a pendant made of copper and bearing on one side, encircling the head of a saint, the legend in Latin, "Mater Dolorosa-Ora pronobis," and on the transverse side the inscription projections as weare of the

inscription, encircling a scene of the crucifixion, "Mort pour vous." The two ornaments and coin would imply that some of the early Spanish fathers or their dependents during the mission period of Southern California history had adventured north as far as the mouth of Rogue River and thence inland up the Illinois River to the Wal-

Spanlards Discover Rogue River. It is a fact well attested by the early logs and records of Spanish sea ad-venturers that the mouth of Rogue River was discovered as early as the closing years of the 15th and opening years of the 16th centuries, for Ban-croft and other earlier historians have cited the reference to landings by Spanish sea explorers on the Oregon coast at a latitude of 42 degrees, which is practically the latitude of the mouth of Rogue River, and their records show a wide-mouthed river pouring a wealth of red waters into the ocean, which on account of its color could be traced for a mile or more into the Pacific, In fact it is an early tradition that Rogue River was named by the Spaniards "Rouge" on account of its drainage of thousands of acres of red lands.

Having access to these early logs and records, as they unquestionably did, it would have been an easy and fascinating journey for later fathers of the church domiciled in California and with the wanderlust in their veins to have followed along the coast in lighthave followed along the coast in light-draft ships to the mouth of Rogue River, up that stream by easy naviga-tion to its confluence with the Illition to its confluence with the Illinois and then overland to the gold
