

HOME BREWERIES TOPIC OF DEBATE

Big Crowd Applauds C. E. S. Wood and Dr. Clarence True Wilson in Plaza Block.

JUDGE MORROW REFEREE

Lawyer Says Substitution of Mild for Strong Drink Solution of Evil. Minister Pleads for Eradication of Plague.

To allow home brewers the same rights in Oregon that are now allowed California and Eastern brewers was the appeal made by C. E. S. Wood, speaking before an audience in the plaza blocks yesterday noon during a debate with Rev. Clarence True Wilson who attacked the brewers' amendment. Dr. Wilson contended that enactment of the measure would restore the evils that prohibition has eliminated.

"I agree with Mr. Wilson that the saloon is an evil," said Colonel Wood, who opened the argument, "and stand firm in my belief that it should be driven out of Oregon, but I believe that the only way to combat the evil of strong drinks is to put milder beverages in their place. There are many arguments against the stronger intoxicants, but the real evils are associated with whiskey, rum and alcohol. In all of the experience that other countries have had with the liquor habit, they found the surest way of weakening the grip of the vice was by introducing a milder drink.

Thorough Test Asked.
An appeal to give the prohibition laws a thorough test was presented by Dr. Wilson in his speech against the amendment. The inability of the prohibition laws to prevent entirely illicit liquor sales cited by Colonel Wood was looked upon as an evil which the state could in time abolish.

"There have been only eight months of prohibition in this state," said Dr. Wilson, "and already we are in much better shape than we were before. Colonel Wood admits that alcohol is a poison, but advocates the sale of this poison, only in milder form. The result will be that people can take more of the milder stimulant and get the same evil results.

"We abolished our gambling resorts here, closed up our dives, enforced the Sunday closing law. Later we made the saloons close their doors after 1 o'clock. Now we have closed them up for all time, but we must not now permit beer to be sold from house to house by brewery wagons. Pot beer is more harmful to our young men than whiskey. The only way to make this state so dry that no one can get a drop of liquor here is to vote for the dry amendment in the coming election.

"The difference between Oregon's dry law and the California freedom is illustrated by the fact that in all the prohibition speeches that I made throughout the State of California, there were always a number of drunken men at the meetings that had to be suppressed. And here in Portland I never have encountered a drunken man at any of the meetings."

Judge Robert G. Morrow, who acted as referee at the debate, advised those present to consider the evidence that had been presented and render their judgment on November 7.

THEFT SUSPECTS CAUGHT

McMinnville Man Identifies Stolen Hides at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—When attempting to sell a quantity of hides to a local junk dealer, R. A. Smith and Harry White, both well-dressed young men, were arrested by the police.

J. H. Kinsmann, of McMinnville, arrived today and identified the hides as property stolen from him, which were reputed to be worth more than \$100. The young men brought the hides here in a rented automobile. They refused to be taken back to Oregon for trial, so warrants were served upon them charging them with having stolen property in their possession. They were taken to the county jail, and if they will not waive extradition, papers will be requested.

DRUGGIST TO VISIT COURT

Jamaica Ginger Bottle Labeled—Alcohol Drinkers Fined.

Robert Moran drank a concoction of Jamaica ginger and his joy-inducing beverage landed him in the city jail. He appeared before Judge Langguth yesterday morning, but sentence was not pronounced until the druggist who sold him the Jamaica ginger is called to confer with police officers. The bottle taken from him as evidence bore the label of the Flummie Drug Company.

Four other alcohol drinkers appeared before Judge Langguth yesterday morning. George Geary was sentenced to five days in jail, John Holgren 10 days and Howard Crysler two days. Eugene Simmons was fined \$10.

FIVE-CENT LOAF DOOMED

HAYNES-FOSTER COMPANY WILL RAISE PRICE MONDAY.

West Side Will Get No More Small Loaves, and Plan Will Be Extended When Pans Arrive.

The movement to eliminate the 5-cent loaf of bread from the market, which has been under way for some time under pressure of the rising prices of flour and baking supplies, will get a decided impetus Monday when the Haynes-Foster Baking Company, whose manager is president of the Bakers' Association of Oregon, will discontinue the manufacture of 5-cent loaves for West-Side delivery. As soon as sufficient pans for the large-sized loaves can be obtained, the remainder of the 5-cent output will be stopped by this concern also.

Thus far the Master Bakers' Association has refrained from concerted action on the subject of raising prices or cutting sizes of loaves, each baker preferring to work out the problem to suit himself. This policy will probably be abandoned in the face of new advances in flour prices, and it is likely that a definite plan will be considered at the meeting of the association to be held Monday night.

Other principal bakeries of the city are expected to follow the plan of the Haynes-Foster Company, although some still feel that the 5-cent service should be continued and a reduction in the size of the loaf be made to correspond to the advance in cost of raw materials.

The Nation-wide movement among bakers to urge the President to place an embargo on shipment of any more wheat out of the country is urgently before the local association and will be one of the subjects to be considered at the meeting Monday.

AMERICA NOT LIKED

Canadians Place This Nation in Class With Mexico.

WILSON POLICY IS CAUSE

Preponderance of Hughes Sentiment Found in Ohio and Middle-West by Mrs. Estelle Tillman, Back From Tour.

Mrs. Estelle Tillman, 1408 East Broadway, has just returned from an extended stay in her old home in Ohio. She traveled West on the Canadian Pacific and relates some interesting, albeit humiliating, experiences, which, taken by and large, convince her that the United States is not held in very high regard by the Canadian people or by their English cousins.

"I met scores of soldiers on the trains," said Mrs. Tillman yesterday. "Some of them had served on the allied front in Flanders. All were of one mind in their opinion of America. They held this Government in the utmost contempt."

"Why, they even place us in the same class with Mexico. They argue that our Government, as administered by President Wilson and his associates at Washington, has no ability, no courage, no determination of purpose."

Wilson Inspires No Confidence.
The Canadian people, the Canadian soldiers and some English soldiers whom I met have no confidence whatever in President Wilson and his Administration. They declare that there is only one outstanding figure in American life that commands itself to the admiration of foreign countries. That person is Roosevelt. They believe that had Mr. Roosevelt been President during the last few years the United States would not now find itself in the humiliating position that it is in, that we would have commanded the respect and admiration of the entire world, yet maintained a dignified peace through all the European struggles.

"The people in Canada will be surprised if we re-elect Wilson," she reports, have led her to the conclusion that Wilson will not be re-elected. Ohio and the Middle West contain a preponderance of Hughes sentiment, she says.

"Every woman ought to vote for Hughes," she says, "because he has promised to support the National suffrage amendment."

Liquor Interests Oppose Hughes.
"To oppose Hughes is to put yourself in the same class with the whiskey distillers, the beer brewers, the saloonkeepers and the bartenders. They are opposed to him because he stands for suffrage. The liquor interests know that when women get the ballot they soon will be driven out of business."

Mrs. Tillman says that the Senatorial contest in Ohio between ex-Governor Myron T. Herrick and Atlee Pomerene is an absorbing issue in that state. Senator Pomerene is a candidate for re-election. The result will be close, but she is of the opinion that Mr. Herrick will win.

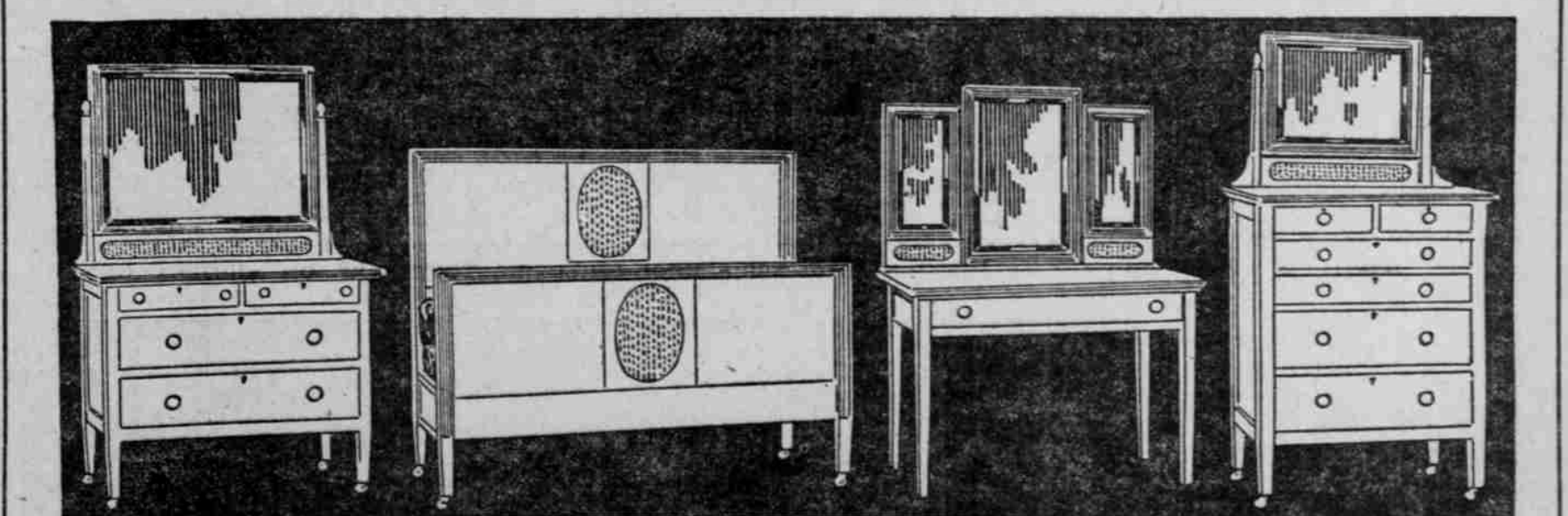
