

MICHIGAN TO SEND FULL DELEGATION

State Expected to Be Solidly Republican in Congress First Time in Years.

COLONEL WELL RECEIVED

Great Audience at Detroit Intent on Every Word—Labor Men to Be Undeceived Regarding "Eight-Hour" Law.

DETROIT, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—Michigan, which is conceded by the Democratic campaign managers to be in the Republican column this year, will roll up a substantial majority for the Hughes and Fairbanks ticket and probably, for the first time in years, will send a solid Republican delegation to Congress. At present Michigan has two Democrats in the House of Representatives, one of them, Frank Dornum, of Detroit, the chairman of the National Democratic Congressional committee.

Michigan is one of the states in which Woodrow Wilson is stronger than his party and from this time forth the efforts of the managers of the National campaign will be in the direction of whittling down the Wilson support. A start was made last Saturday, when Colonel Roosevelt unlimbered his guns at Battle Creek and tore to tatters the record of the Wilson Administration.

Labor to Be Set Right.
There is a large labor vote in Michigan, found largely in the various factories. Among these laboring men has been a strong Wilson sentiment, due to the belief which has grown current that the President is a true friend of labor. Democratic campaign managers have put forth all manner of devices to convince the laboring men that Mr. Hughes is hostile to their interests and to convince them also that Mr. Hughes is a "tool of Wall street."

Regardless of the fact that these leaders have resorted to untruthful charges and to deliberate misrepresentation, the poison injected has had a telling effect, and the purpose of the Republican campaign managers is to set the voters right by letting all the facts be known. Clearly in the campaign the Republicans were so confident of success in Michigan that they paid little attention to the activities of the Democratic leaders and while they rested on their oars no inconsiderable damage was done. That damage will now be undone.

Colonel's Speech Effective.
Colonel Roosevelt's speech will have tremendous influence with the labor element in Michigan and what he had to say of President Wilson and of the Adamson law in all its phases will do much to unmake the Wilson votes that have been gained by misrepresentation. The Colonel made himself clearly understood. His speech is being widely and closely read.

The Roosevelt speech at Battle Creek was interesting in several particulars. Aside from what the Colonel said, the manner in which he uttered was received with wide commendation upon. It is doubtful if the Colonel ever faced a more interested or more intelligent audience than the 10,000 who heard him on that occasion, but it also is true that he probably never before delivered so vigorous a talk and was greeted with more frequent applause.

That Battle Creek audience, it might be said, sat spell-bound. It followed Colonel Roosevelt with the keenest interest. Yet, through the delivery of the speech, the vast audience seldom applauded at length, seeming to prefer to hear everything the Colonel had to say.

Adamson Law is Boomerang.
If there was one topic on which Colonel Roosevelt was enthusiastic, it was approval from the Battle Creek audience, more than on any other. It was when he condemned the President's surrender on the Adamson law that the crowd applauded his denunciation of the surrender and the way other mid-Western audience have applauded Mr. Hughes' analysis of that same law and his denunciation of the surrender to force, has left no doubt that an issue which the public studies and for his own benefit has in fact become a boomerang that will, in the end, materially impair his own prospects.

The longer the public studies the misbranded "eight-hour law," the more it seems to disapprove that piece of legislation and the manner of its enactment. If the reception of the Roosevelt and Hughes speeches on the subject are any indication of popular sentiment.

DAM WILL BE REBUILT
MACKAY PROJECT, NEAR BOISE, IS REVIVED.
Plans Are Modified So as to Make Construction Safe and Land Board Approves.

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—The Mackay dam, above the town of Mackay, for years a bone of contention in politics, is going to be built. The State Engineer has approved the revised plans and the State Land Board has accepted them. The Utah Construction Company, which controls the dam site, has started work on the structure. Behind this dam water will be impounded for the Big Lost River irrigation project.

This project has also played a conspicuous part in the life of the state, many settlers who took land under it having been forced to leave it because the promoting company became financially embarrassed and later failed. In time the Utah Construction Company purchased the project at a forced sale. The citizens of Mackay protested against the use of the old dam site for the new dam, on the ground it was unsafe and will endanger all of the property and lives at Mackay. Finally the proposed plan of the Utah Construction Company were submitted to J. P. Lippincott, a prominent California engineer, who declined them. To meet this criticism the plans were revised. The State Engineer recommended their approval and the Land Board adopted the recommendations.

FRUITS WILL BE SHOWN
Vegetables and Flowers to Share in Corvallis Honors.

CORVALLIS, Or., Oct. 7.—Oregon fruits, vegetables and flowers will be assembled in their choicest forms and exhibited in arrangements that best display their varied and attractive qualities at the third annual horticultural show to be held in the men's gymnasium at the Agricultural College on November 3 and 4.

This show will be the largest and best ever held at the college," said Professor C. I. Lewis, chief of the horticultural division. "And an attempt will be made to make it comprehensive enough to afford visitors a fairly adequate idea of the wonderful scope and character of our horticultural resources. Our state section exhibits last year with students from different parts of the state competing for the most creditable exhibits brought together some splendid displays, and with that experience to guide, results should be much better this year. Visitors throughout the state are invited to co-operate with students from their districts in collecting exhibits that show their horticultural possibilities."

In addition to Oregon products, collections will be on display from other states and the West Indies and countries. The sub-tropical collections constitute features of interest. Packing, storage and shipping methods, with cold storage and grading and packing devices, contribute to the educational features. Student contests in preparing exhibits, grading and packing devices, packing for shipping and other like features serve to bring out the great value of right methods of handling. The horticultural show is said to be a big factor in developing Oregon horticulture.

RAILROAD DEAL PENDS
COOS BAY RESIDENTS AWAITING ARRIVAL OF CONTRACTOR.
Announcement That Line Would Be Built to Roseburg Is Expected to Be Verified Soon.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—The expected visit of George Volkman to Coos Bay is regarded here as significant, because of his connections with railroad builders. Mr. Volkman is a nephew of Sir Robert Perks, probably the greatest general contractor in the world. The Perks company has constructed railroads, docks and harbor improvements all over the world, and has been particularly active in the West Indies and South America. The American branch of the Perks Company, the MacArthur & Perks Company, Limited, financed and was ready to build the Willamette-Pacific Railroad, when the Southern Pacific purchased the rights and ownership of the road. The MacArthur & Perks Company, however, got the contract of building the railroad.

Mr. Volkman, in 1911, when the Willamette-Pacific was projected, was among the first of the MacArthur & Perks people on the ground and came after all the surveys were made and passed, as a consulting engineer, on the line and recommended that it be financed.

An announcement was made here four months ago by W. J. Wiley, that another railroad would be constructed between Coos Bay and Roseburg. Wiley was the forerunner of the Willamette-Pacific. But Mr. Wiley's people sold out to the Southern Pacific Railroad, and the time is interested in obtaining a seaport outlet for their lumber have arranged that there will be no bargaining in the proposed railroad between Roseburg and Coos Bay, and from information considered the best, the new road will not belong to the Southern Pacific.

MEDFORD RAISES \$1223
PROCEEDS OF BIG SALE WILL GO TO WOUNDED FRENCH SOLDIERS.
Special Object of Oregon Generosity Will Be Reckitt Johnstone Hospital, Near Paris.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—The grand market and rummage sale held in Medford last week for the benefit of wounded French soldiers made a net profit of more than \$1200 in two days. It is believed that this sets a new high record in war relief for any community in the country no larger than Medford.

The total receipts, according to the report of John Orth, treasurer, amounted to \$1345.84, expenses \$122.01, net profit \$1223.83. A check for this amount will be sent this week to the Reckitt Johnstone Hospital, near Paris, which is maintained by Harold Reckitt, of London, and Lady Johnstone, sister of Edward Pinchock.

Mr. Reckitt is a brother-in-law of Miss Dorothy Conner, daughter of Mrs. Charles Conner, of Jacksonville. Miss Conner was in the Lusitania en route to Paris when the liner was torpedoed off the Irish coast, her narrow escape from death causing quite a sensation on the Pacific Coast at that time.

DRAINAGE PETITION MADE
Lewis County Asked to Deepen Coffee Creek Channel.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—Yesterday W. N. Beal, a local attorney, appeared before the Lewis County Commissioners in the interests of property owners with a petition to deepen the channel of Coffee Creek and drain several hundred acres of adjoining land.

The land in question lies north of Centralia and extends to the Thurston County line. It is of fine quality and the owners are anxious to see work started before the winter sets in. The owners are willing to stand the expense.

A similar petition was presented to the Thurston County officials and heard with their approval. A date of hearing on the petition will be set by the Commissioners later.

DR. HOLLAND WILL SPEAK
President of Washington State College to Go East.

WASHINGTON STATE COLLEGE, Pullman, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—E. O. Holland, of the State College, will address the Oregon Congress of Mothers at their annual convention to be held in The Dalles October 12.

After delivering addresses to the various teachers' institutes in Eastern Washington President Holland will leave for Washington to attend the convention of the American Association of Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations as a delegate from Washington State College. On his way east he will be present at the fourth annual meeting of the Association of Western Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations which convenes at the University of Nebraska.

North Bend Depot Completed.
NORTH BEND, Or., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—J. E. Steiman, contractor of the North Bend Southern Pacific depot, has completed the structure and turned it over to the company. He is moving across to Lakeside to start work on October 9 on the Lakeside depot. There is also a freighthouse and some smaller buildings to construct at Lakeside. The North Bend depot cost the company between \$4000 and \$5000.

DEMOCRATS IN BAY STATE ARE DIVIDED

National Campaign Suffers as Result of Lack of Harmony Locally.

ADAMSON LAW BOOMERANG

Labor Feels That if Congress Can Declare What Employers Shall Pay It Can Tell Men What They Must Accept.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 7.—Massachusetts, judged by the results of the recent primary and by personal observation and investigation, seems to be partial to Hughes rather than Wilson for President. When you stop to consider that there are only five other states in the Union that have as many votes in the electoral college as Massachusetts, you can more readily appreciate the importance of annexing the Bay State to the Hughes column.

Frederick W. Mansfield defeated General Charles H. Cole for the Democratic nomination for Governor despite the fact that Cole was backed by old-line Democrats of the type of ex-Governor Walsh and ex-Mayor Fitzgerald of Boston. Mansfield conducted an independent campaign and his candidacy was supported more particularly by the laboring class—the silent vote. The nomination of Mansfield was a severe rebuff to the machine leaders and indicates a breakdown in the Democratic state organization. It has divided—though promisingly—leaders of Boston and the state at large.

Although a Democrat sat in the Governor's chair at the Statehouse for three years, the state was projected, Samuel W. McCall in 1913, Massachusetts ordinarily is strongly Republican. In 1908 Taft swept the state by a majority of 110,000. Wilson polled the state's electoral votes in 1912 by 17,000 votes over Taft, his nearest rival. Taft and Roosevelt together received nearly 500,000 votes as against 175,000 for Wilson. The Republicans and Progressives, from all surface indications, are reunited and will face Democracy November 7 with a solid front.

Conversations with laboring men both in Cambridge and Boston have convinced me that the Adamson law has proved to be somewhat of a political boomerang to President Wilson. In the first place the laboring men object to the limiting of the law to railway trainmen, most of whom, they realize, are already receiving much higher wages than laborers employed in other occupations. They do not challenge the merits of the proposition that trainmen are entitled to higher wages, but they feel that discrimination should not be made in favor of one class of laborers as against other classes.

They say that if anyone is entitled to higher wages and shorter hours it is the man who wields the pick and shovel or who is employed in a highly specialized factory, where chances of advancement are slight. In the second place they argue that the principle laid down in the Adamson law will work both ways; if Congress can tell the employers what they shall pay, it can likewise tell the laboring men what they shall accept.

The discrimination between classes in the so-called eight-hour law came in for severe condemnation at the home of Allan L. Benson, Socialist nominee for President, in his address in Boston a few days ago. His audience was composed largely of laboring men, and the hearty applause which greeted his remarks was a clear indication of their feeling.

WHITMAN COLLEGE, Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—Following the example of the Eastern colleges, the students of Whitman College are entering into the National politics campaign with a great deal of enthusiasm and in the past week have formed thriving Hughes-Fairbanks and Wilson-Marshall clubs.

These clubs have affiliated with the local organizations and the Republican Club is planning to join the National Association of College Clubs, which the Republican National Committee is promoting.

Idaho County Officials Sued.
LEWISTON, Idaho, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—H. M. Pluharty has begun an action in the District Court of Nez Perce County against the County Commissioners for the recovery of \$7000, which was appropriated for the Nez Perce County fair during 1914. Mr. Pluharty instituted a former action restraining the Board of Commissioners from appropriating further amounts, which action has been upheld by the Supreme Court of Idaho.

TARIFF HAS NO HYPHEN

HALF-FREE, HALF-PROTECTION POLICY IS ASSAILED.

Farmers' Union Official Pleads to Congress for Protection of Cotton by 12-Cent Minimum Federal Loan.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—In a memorial to Congress today entitled "The American Farmer and His Government," H. N. Pope, president of the Association of State Farmers' Union Presidents, favors protection on all agricultural products, declares that no country can thrive half protected and half free, insists that there is no such thing as a hyphenated tariff and asks that cotton be protected by a 12-cent minimum loan from the Government.

The memorial says in part: "The Southern cotton farmer, in demanding that Congress empower the Federal Reserve Board to fix and protect a 12-cent per pound minimum loan price on cotton advances no new doctrine in Government, for it has been the policy of this Nation ever since we have had a Nation to protect home industries. Cotton is our only agricultural product that cannot be helped by a protective tariff, and must, therefore, seek other means of protection."

The cotton producer is the only class of farmers who have been compelled to sell what he produced on a free market and buy what he consumed on a protected market, and as a consequence the cotton fields of the South have more tenants, more poverty and more suffering than any other class of farmers in the Western Hemisphere. This condition should challenge, but not baffle, American statesmanship."
