Every person who has followed the boxing game knows that Roche and Pollok have formed a combination for years; that it was common talk that with Roche protecting Welsh in the ring it would be almost impossible to get a decision against Welsh.

"The only way I could get the match with Welsh, after having pursued him for two years, was to accept Roche as referee. 
