MULTNOMAH COUNTY TO HAVE 375 POLLING PLACES TUESDAY Portland Has 344 Precincts-109 on West Side, and 235 on East Side, Including St. Johns, but Not Linnton, Which Is Grouped With 31 in "Country."

VOTES for President of the United States will be cast in more polling places in Multnomah County next Tuesday than in any previous Presidential election. There are a total of
