The game was played in a drizzling
rain, the fleid being slow and slippery,

With Idaho's ball on the 20-yard line, Idaho punted and Durham replaced Brown for a possible dropkick, but Boone gainted ten yards and Bangs skirted right end 16 yards for a touchdown and kicked goal.

Idaho failed to gain after the kickoff. Then Boone advanced the ball 40 yards in nine plays, Bangs going over for the final score.

Idaho played a rough game and was penalized three times for rough tactics.




