

BIG DEAL STILL ON

Dubois Timber Sale Regarded as Likely Prospect.

\$4,000,000 IS INVOLVED

Tract Lies in Clatsop and Columbia Counties—Idaho Sugar People Interested—Plan Is to Develop Property.

Despite rumors that have been circulated recently to the effect that the \$4,000,000 option taken by the Oregon Lumber Company on timber of John Dubois had fallen through, it was learned last night upon good authority that the proposed deal is still very much alive and being considered seriously every day.

The timber involved in the proposed purchase embraces 30,000 acres situated 40 miles south and inland from Westport, a station along the Columbia River, and 50 miles southeast of Astoria. The tract lies partly in Clatsop County and partly in Columbia County, and in a belt noted for its quality of timber.

The option on the holding was taken on September 15 by the Oregon Lumber Company, of which D. C. Eccles, of Ogden, Utah, is president and Charles T. Early, of Hood River and Portland, is general manager and secretary.

Purchase is Investigated. It became known last night that C. W. Nibley, president of the Utah-Idaho Sugar Company, and W. W. Wattis, president of the Utah Construction Company, which built practically all of the Western Pacific Railroad Company, have been in Oregon to investigate the proposed purchase.

It is understood that at least \$4,000,000 is involved in the proposed deal and that it will carry with it the construction of a sawmill having a capacity of at least 20,000 feet a day.

Considerable Time Required. When Mr. Dubois went East recently he was accompanied as far as Salt Lake by Paul C. Bates, who represented the Oregon Lumber Company in the transaction during the absence of Mr. Eccles and Mr. Early.

In view of the fact that it requires considerable time to cruise a timber tract of such dimensions and to figure railroad connections, it probably will be some time before the transaction is finally disposed of.

STORES TO BE GREAT ART GALLERY OF MERCHANDISE.

Silver Cup and Ribbons Are Offered for Most Attractive Display Arranged for Shoppers.

All Portland will be made a show place in the Greater Portland day window-trimming contest, which will be open for the inspection of the public Tuesday.

The trimmers will finish their work and the windows will be in readiness actually Monday night, when the big night crowds will have the opportunity of getting an advance view of the show.

Besides the grand prize, silver cup from Felix Bloch, there will be 25 ribbon awards on numerous classes of displays.

Under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce a window-dressing contest was held about a year ago, but its scope was not nearly so large as that of the present contest, which is the first of its kind that the city has ever known.

Nearly 250 stores will compete. The whole business section of the city will become the gallery in which the pictures built by the window trimmers will be displayed and the spectators will be able to wander through this gallery of modern merchandise, for hours and still have more to see.

The judges will be C. W. English, L. A. McMullen and John Hardy. Following is the classification of the displays that will be entered:
