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PROFESSOR WINS HONOR
Plant Pathologist Made Associate Editor Scientific Paper.
OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 12.—(Special).—Professor H. B. Barss, head of the department of botany and plant pathology at the Oregon Agricultural College, has recently received word of his appointment as associate editor of Phytopathology, the official publication of the American Phytopathological Society and the only journal in America devoted exclusively to the discussion of diseases of plants.
The appointment comes as a distinct recognition of the standing of the department of botany and plant pathology of the Oregon Agricultural College as a leader of scientific work of this kind in the Northwest.
