GIRLS here's an opportunity of a lifetime! It's a chance you can't afford to miss. All you have to do is to join the Girls' National Honor Guard, and a world of benefits will be added unto you free of charge. You will have your patriotism strengthened, your education improved and you'll meet some lovely girls and have a jolly good time.

Miss Lucille Danforth, state chairman, is determined to make Oregon one of the first, if not the very first, of the states to get 1000 members. A recruiting station has been established on the fifth floor of the Meier & Frank building in a corner that is draped in flags and is most attractive. Here, every afternoon, may be found a committee of two prominent society girls taking the names of those who wish to become a part of the great order that is banded together for study, work, the encouragement of patriotism and the general welfare of the members.

Three corps have been formed, and each member may choose what course she will take up. The lessons will be given by experts and will be free of charge. The only cost is \$5 cents for membership. If the girls want to show their interest to a more marked degree they may buy a guard pin in gold and the National colors.

Study Course Outlined.

Following is the outline of study:

Corps 1.

Cut and roll bandages.

Prepare sponges and towels.

Sterilize instruments.

Disinfect.

Diet-cooking and care of beds.

Correct use of tourniquet and hypodermic.

Correct knowledge of pulse and temperature.

Corps 2.

Care of children.

Plain cooking.

Sewing.

Social service nursing.

Letter-writing and reading.

Corps 3.

Driving and understanding automobiles.

Riding, swimming and shooting.

Management of motor and sailboats.

Telegraphy and wireless codes.

Farming and agriculture.

Shorthand and correct reporting.

Geographical locations of states, principal cities, forts and hospitals.

Following are extracts from the constitution of the guard. These will give an idea of what is required:

The Girls' National Honor Guard shall be organized for the purpose of creating a spirit of patriotism and duty among the girls of America.

The duties of the Girls' National Honor Guard shall be to inculcate the spirit of unity and learning to do one thing well, which shall prove helpfulness and value both in duration of peace as well as times of war. Hence it shall be the duty of each girl of the Girls' National Honor Guard to maintain the honor of the country, the principles of the Government of the United States and the respect and honor of the institution.

Any young woman between the ages of 14 and 30 years, with a knowledge of the working of her government and a recognition of the needs of her country and an appreciation of the sacredness of her obligations, is eligible for admission. Any young woman who has once affiliated herself with this movement may remain as such while she maintains the principles of the institution and is amenable to its rules and regulations.

It shall be distinctly understood that any girl whilst having full freedom to express her views respecting any policy, action or conduct on the part of those holding executive offices in the United States, shall yet respect the position of the same and accord that position the sustained respect and deference due it. The same shall be in effect concerning any position in the Girls' National Honor Guard.

Miss Craig said, "I think if the University of Washington has 200 girls in one corps, we should hurry up and show what Oregon can do."

Loyalty not only to the flag and to the country are pledged by the members, but loyalty to each other is promised. The pledge regarding the flag will appeal to the flag committee of the D. A. R. who are always on the look out for the maintenance of perfect respect for the colors. Following are the pledges that the guard must take:

I do hereby solemnly covenant on my word of honor to faithfully and earnestly maintain the principles of the Girls' National Honor Guard, to uphold our National honor from criticism, the American flag from desecration, and the Government of the United States and those who represent it from personal disrespect.

I solemnly pledge loyalty and good fellowship toward all members of the Girls' National Honor Guard regardless of their creed or station, and I will faithfully stand by each member, giving whatever aid and encouragement within my power in times of need.

I fully realize that this organization does not allow in any form whatsoever, slanders, malicious or unjust criticism, hypocrisy, disloyalty or pretentiousness, that any word of action detrimental to the principles of the Honor Guard shall be considered a disgrace, and by so doing I forfeit my Honor Guard badge, and at the same time acknowledge the rightful authority of the officers of the guard to suspend me from any duties until my appeal is decided upon by the National headquarters.

Furthermore, I solemnly pledge to show respect to "The Star-Spangled Banner," the national flag, and will not permit it to be used in any way that would bring it into disrepute, never remain flying after sundown, never be raised stars downward, and as a signal of distress, never be run down.
