

\$3,342,360,000 WAR BUDGET IS PASSED

Senate Approves Without Roll Call and Bill Is Sent to Conference.

\$542,000,000 IS ADDED

Measure Expected to Be Ready for President's Signature Within Week—Student Officers to Receive \$100 Monthly.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—The Administration's initial war budget, increased to a total of \$3,342,360,000 by the addition of \$750,000,000 for the merchant fleet construction programme, passed the Senate today without a roll call.

As it passed the House, the measure carried approximately \$2,800,000,000 and did not include the ship programme appropriation. This provision was put in by the Senate at the request of the Administration and is expected to receive the approval of the House conference without much delay.

Most of the money appropriated will go to pay expenses of the war Army and of the increased Navy and Marine Corps already authorized. The largest single items are for pay of enlisted men. There also are big appropriations for equipment fortifications and munitions.

The military establishment will get about \$2,225,000,000 of the total, and the Navy about \$500,000,000. For clothing and camp gear equipment nearly a quarter of a billion is provided, and for coast and insular fortifications more than half a billion. An item of \$1,000,000 for the purchase of land is included in the Navy's quota.

The bill, by far the largest supply measure ever considered in Congress, was debated less than three days in the Senate, most of the discussion centering about the \$750,000,000 merchant marine appropriation.

Among appropriations adopted were payment of \$100 monthly to reserve officers during active service, and other items were approved as drawn.
