

Bearish forecasts of the Government crop report exerted only a tran-sient depressing influence. Oats hardened in response to the strength of other cereals. Doubtless the advance would have been more pronounced but for predictions that the Government crop report would be radically against the bulls. Toreign advices were not encouraging to holdors of provisions.
