

BOARD SITS UNDER POLICE PROTECTION

Mayor's Appointees Try to Gain Advantage in Chicago School Meeting.

IMPEACHMENT PLAN READY

Council Committee Will Meet on Monday to Take Steps to Oust Mayor Thompson; "Joke," Says the Mayor.

CHICAGO, June 23.—Members of the Chicago Board of Education, including those recently appointed by Mayor Thompson, whose right to office is in question because of the City Council's reconsideration of confirmation, met today under the protection of 32 uniformed policemen and 18 detectives and after two hours of jockeying for advantage by the two factions, adjourned to meet July 2. The only business transacted was the adoption of a motion to reassure teachers in the city schools and employees of the Board that they need not fear summary dismissal because of the internal strife.

Meanwhile the judiciary committee of the City Council announced that it would consider on Monday the resolution of impeachment directed against Mayor William H. Thompson which was offered at yesterday's turbulent Council meeting. MacKay Hoyle, State Attorney, will be called in to advise on the matter. Mr. Hoyle has given it as his opinion that the Mayor's action in refusing to entertain the resolution of the Council meeting and in declaring the meeting adjourned was abuse of power and ground for impeachment proceedings.

After the Mayor had called an adjournment and left the chamber, dodging books hurled at his head by Aldermen and followed by cries of "robber," the session was reconvened and adopted the resolutions attacking the Mayor. The matter will be first considered by the judiciary committee. Anti-Thompson Aldermen largely predominate in the Council and in the committee.

Mayor Thompson said today that talk of his resigning was a "joke."

LIQUOR SEIZURE UPHELD

Washington Court Holds Shipments Lose Interstate Character.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 23.—The state Supreme Court decided today, in the appeal of the Great Northern Railway Company against an order of the Whatcom County Court authorizing the confiscation of 15 cases of whisky seized at Bellingham because permits were not displayed on the casks, that shipment of liquor into prohibition states lost all interstate characteristics under the United States Supreme Court decision upholding the Webb-Kenyon act.

The railroad company contended that the omission of permits on the casks constituted no violation of the liquor shipment law except as to the manner of shipment prescribed by the state law. The Supreme Court affirmed the order of seizure. The liquor, shipped to a drug store in Bellingham, was valued at \$650.

CARMEN ASK INCREASE

Seattle Company Negotiates With Its 2000 Employees.

SEATTLE, June 23.—A committee of streetcar employees of the Seattle Traction Light & Power Company today submitted a demand upon the management of the company for an increase of wages and the eight-hour day. A large number of the men recently joined the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America.

The company for 19 years has refused to employ any union men. One thousand conductors and motormen are employed by the company in Seattle and as many more in other city and suburban lines on Puget Sound. The men's committee found the company officials conciliatory and negotiations are proceeding with no threat of a tie-up made.

VOW SETS CONGRESS WILD

People are realizing more and more that for the sake of further freedom law must be maintained and manifestation of anarchy suppressed.

"The last resolutions which have been framed by the Council of Workmen, the Congress of Peasants and other democratic organizations render the best proof of the general understanding of the necessity of creating strong power. The coalitionary character of the new Cabinet, which includes eminent Socialist leaders and represents all the vital elements of the nation, therefore, enjoying its full support, is most effectively securing the unity and power of the central government, the lack of which was so keenly felt during the first two months after the revolution.

"As to foreign policy, with all emphasis, may I state that Russia rejects any idea of separate peace. I am aware that rumors are circulated in this country that a separate peace

seemed probable. I am happy to affirm that such rumors are wholly without foundation in fact.

"What Russia is aiming for is the establishment of a firm and lasting peace between democratic nations. The triumph of German autocracy would render such peace impossible. It would be the source of the greatest misery, and, besides that, a threatening menace to Russia's freedom.

Army to Be Reorganized.

"The provisional government is laying all emphasis on reorganizing the army for action in common with the allies.

"Gentlemen of the House, I will close my address by saying: Russia will not fail to be a worthy partner in the League of Honor."

When the address was concluded the Russians gathered informally and were introduced to the members by Speaker Clark and other House officials.

Representative Bessie received extra attention from the Russians when they were advised of her identity.

\$20,000,000 MUST BE RAISED IN 2 DAYS

Red Cross Campaign Managers Direct Local Workers to Make Great Efforts.

MONDAY IS PERSHING DAY

Many Cities Refuse to Close Campaign Tomorrow and Will Continue to Aid World's Greatest Humanity Fund.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Twenty million dollars must be collected tomorrow and Monday by the Red Cross volunteer campaigners in American cities and towns to make the week's canvass for a \$100,000,000 fund an entire success. Despite the spectacular spurts of several cities, total new pledges reported to National headquarters today were only \$2,000,000, making the aggregate collections for six days about \$30,000,000.

Campaign managers directed local workers to make strenuous efforts at the next two days to ferret out individuals or corporations who have not contributed, and to impress on them the tremendous importance in America's war scheme of the success of the Red Cross fund.

The need of every humanity dollar that can be collected was emphasized today by Lord Northcliffe, British War Commissioner, now in the United States, in a letter to Henry B. P. McFarland, chairman of the district of Columbia Red Cross finance committee.

Conservation Is Urged.

"In wishing success and prosperity to your efforts," Lord Northcliffe wrote, "I would as an experienced Red Cross worker, urge caution and conservation of effort. You will need every cent you can collect and every pair of human hands you can employ. The war, in my personal opinion, gathered by much experience at the front, is just beginning."

Word reached here tonight that committees in a number of cities will refuse to quit work Monday night when the campaign formally closes. This prolongation of the canvass will be sought in two classes of communities—those like Cleveland and San Francisco, where enthusiasm and piling up over-subscriptions, and cities, where for various local reasons, the campaign did not start until late this week.

Cleveland, which promises to be the star of the week's performance, by noon today made its total \$4,182,000, and passed Chicago, which reported this hour showed \$4,169,000. New York City's total was known to be approaching \$35,000,000.

Ohio Leads All But New York.

Among the other big totals recorded at headquarters tonight were: Cincinnati, \$1,400,000; Detroit, \$2,167,000; Buffalo, \$1,735,000; Pittsburgh, \$2,590,000; Boston, \$2,028,000; St. Louis, \$1,465,000 and Philadelphia, \$1,232,000.

Ohio still leads the states (except for New York), with \$7,092,000. Next was Pennsylvania, with \$6,000,000. Illinois came third with \$1,119,000. Other large state totals were: New York (outside New York City), \$1,591,000; Massachusetts, \$2,250,000; Michigan, \$2,617,253; Missouri, \$2,200,000; New Jersey, \$1,990,000; California, \$1,687,000; Connecticut, \$1,819,000 and Minnesota, \$1,239,000.

In percentage of their population, actually raised Delaware headed the list, with 22.5 per cent, sure to be second with 13.5, Ohio third with 11.8 and Michigan fourth with 10.4.

Monday Is Pershing Day

Tomorrow is Red Cross day in thousands of Sunday schools and churches. Campaign directors expect the harvest from rural districts, where intensive solicitation has not been done this week, to be large in church reports.

In a statement tonight on the designation of Monday as "Pershing day," Secretary Baker said:

"It is eminently fitting that the final day of the Red Cross week—a week devoted to collecting \$100,000,000 for the purposes of humanity—should be called 'Pershing day.' I am sure that the leader first to carry the banner of our citizen soldiers to the Western front, will appreciate the honor, and that his name will be forever associated with the sum required by the Red Cross before the close of Pershing day."

COAST CITIES DOUBLE QUOTAS

No Committee Doubts Ability to Meet Allotment.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—Cities and communities of the Pacific Coast have officially reported, through the local committees in charge, that the funds for the Red Cross subscriptions aggregating in every instance more than 75 per cent of their allotments, and in many instances far in excess of the first goal.

California points, including San Francisco and Los Angeles, have reported \$1,812,000, or nearly two-thirds of the quota of \$3,000,000 for the state; the contributions reported up to tonight do not include many of the cities and towns which have campaigns actively under way.

In Washington, Spokane, Bellingham, Aberdeen and Walla Walla have reported contributions in excess of their quotas; in Oregon, Portland, Eugene, Medford and Salem have reset their marks; in Montana, Great Falls, Billings and Butte have raised their full allotments and other cities have reported satisfactory progress.

Among the over-subscriptions, Ashland, Or., has doubled its allotment of \$5000; Great Falls, Mont., asked for \$25,000, has subscribed \$60,000; Portland, Or., has exceeded its quota of \$200,000 by \$33,340, and Calexico, Cal., has passed its quota of \$5000 by \$500.

Those cities which have attained their original goals have fixed a new high mark, in some instances double the first goal, and have continued their campaigns. No local committee has expressed any fear that its district or city would fail to attain the mark set for it by the final hour of the drive.

WOMEN HELP RAISE FUNDS

Spokane's Contribution Is \$142,000, \$42,000 in Excess of Quota.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 23.—(Special.)—Spokane women took hold of a house-to-house canvass for the Red Cross fund today and more money poured in. The combined efforts of women and men, \$7000 for the day, the city brought the total up to \$142,000, or \$42,000 in excess of Spokane's quota.

Up to noon today more than \$12,000 had been pledged from towns in Spokane County and reports were coming in at a rate which exceeded each new figure estimated by those in charge.

Captain William S. Wood, of the Second Battery, lined his battery on the drill ground the other day to find to his surprise that during the night an entire gun and caisson had been dismantled and made away with. The stakes later were found in the position of an improvised gutter bridge which children had constructed.

It will be a monumental job to whip into shape the human material with which the regular Army officers are working in less than two months remaining. With the batteries this is especially true, and the Army men are said to be a unit in admitting that the best which can possibly be done will be to drive home a superficial knowledge, which will serve as the foundation for many more months of study after commissions have been received.

And commissions are not going to be sprinkled about generously. One battery of 135 men was told that if it was lucky 43 of its number would land commissions at the end of the three months' work.

It is generally considered here that many commissions awarded in the Reserve Corps prior to the opening of the camp will receive some revision as the result of the tryouts of the officers here, if it is only to retire the holders to the inactive reserve. Not all who have received commissions as field officers in the reserve on the strength of previous service, or possibly political influence, have demonstrated fitness for the positions in the field work.

In the shakeup at the conclusion of the first month's training many surprises were in store for candidates.

For example, one Portland man who had applied for a commission in infantry or Coast artillery, found himself relegated to the field artillery, though he scarcely knew a horse from a mule. And his application for a transfer to infantry or Coast artillery "disappeared" by the powers that be. He can but resign or shoulder the handicap.

At least a dozen men with commissions in the infantry and cavalry have been assigned to field artillery, there being a need for artillerymen, though

none for cavalrymen. Latest reports are that the cavalry will be disbanded and trained here precisely the same as infantry.
