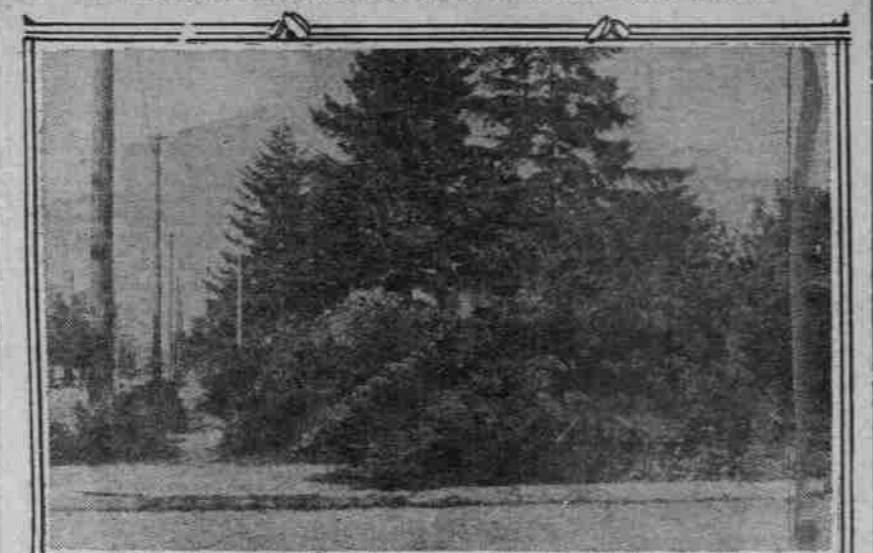
Mazamas' Outing Is Set to Follow N. E. A. Meeting.

MESS FUND GROWS \$200.

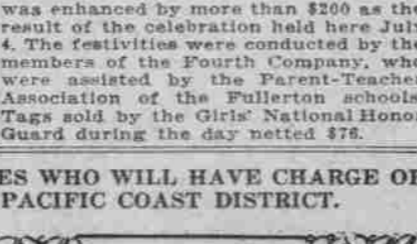
