Stopped by City Employees.

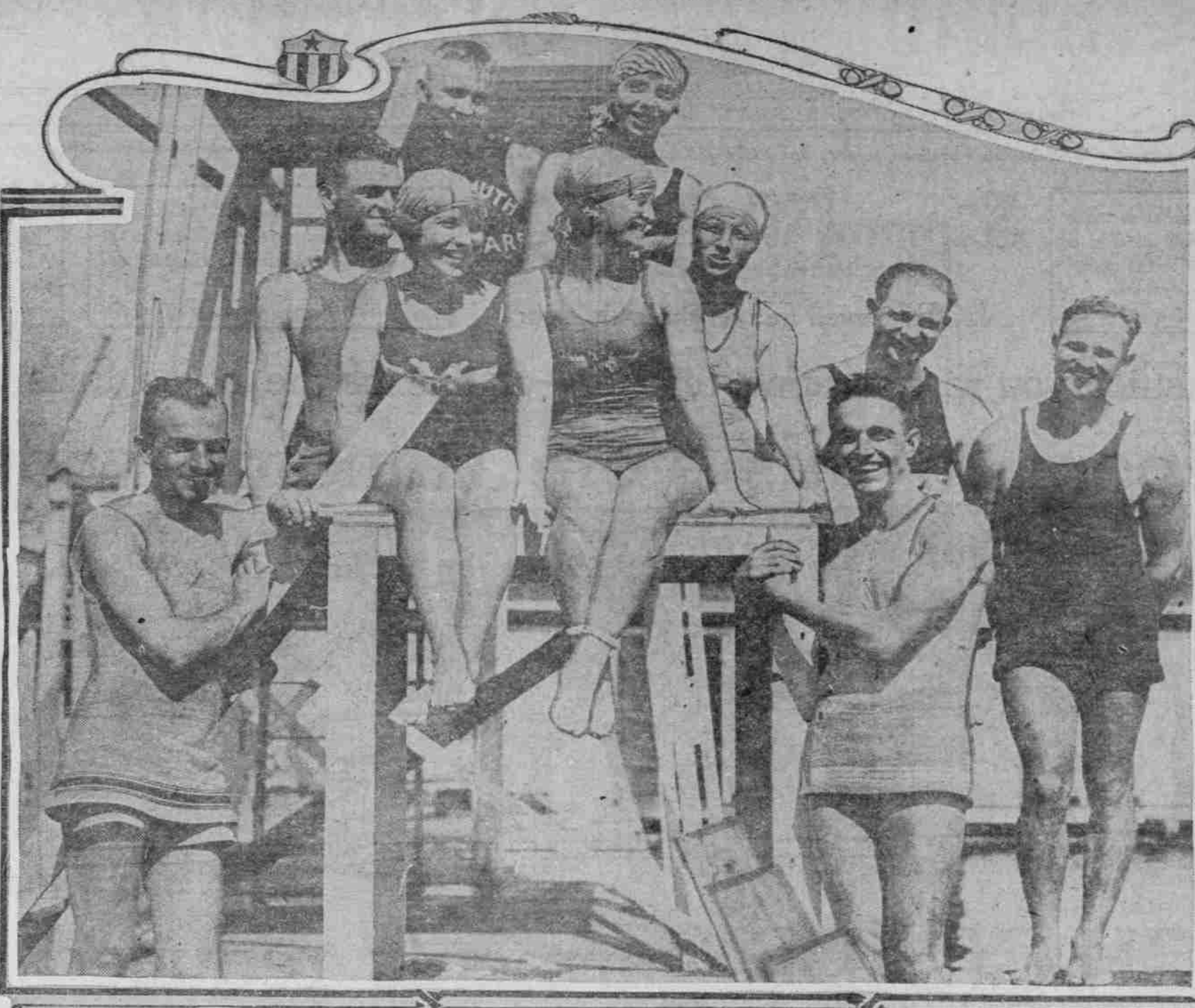

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NORTHWEST LEAGUE ABOUT TO SUSPEND

D. E. Dugdale, Owner of Seat-
tle Club, Admits Organiza-
tion Is on Rocks.

BLEWETT NOT OPTIMISTIC

Head of Organization Sees Early
Date for Quitting—Bad Weather,
Long Jumps and War Cut
Down Revenues.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 7.—(Special.)—The Northwest League is on the rocks. After withstanding the stormy billows of war and bad weather for several months, the staunch old craft that has weathered many a gale has finally been forced to turn her wobbly prow toward shore.

Although officials of the league have not yet voted to quit, it has been learned that the organization will be forced to throw up the sponge in a few days. Owner D. E. Dugdale, of the Seattle club, was the first to admit that the going was too tough, and declared that the league was doomed.

"As much as we hate to quit, it's the only course," declared the veteran baseball president Saturday. The combination of a rainy spring, the war and the long jump to the Montana cities is too much for the organization to stand up under.

Situation Looks Dark.
While loath to admit that his league will go out of business, President Robert Blewett declared that things looked dark. He would not say that the directors favored quitting at an early date, but expressed the opinion that the league could not possibly keep going under the present circumstances.

While the Montana owners have not been heard from, Bob Brown, Vancouver boss, is ready to pull up the white flag any time his fellow-directors say the word. Spokane has had a poor season, while Tacoma has far from prospered. With four directors favoring quits, the prospects are for a crash in the very near future.

The beacon light which will cause the league to founder is the troubled baseball seas is an action taken by the National Commission a few days ago. It was decided by the supreme court of baseball that minor leagues should be allowed to retain their franchises and player rights.

Hopes Held for Next Year.
Assured that the league can start all over again next year, the directors are looking forward to the future with some hope of success next season. Had the big chiefs in the East not voted to allow the clubs to retain their privileges, it is probable that the magnates would have stuck it out and staided for the season.

The Seattle team will leave for Montana Sunday night as scheduled, Dugdale said, but after the series the party magnates will not say how much longer he expects to hold his club together.

"I would not want to say just when we will disband," he said. "But I think we will not be able to go much farther is inevitable."

Seattle Club to Profit.
Seattle will profit by the ceasing of baseball activities. Dugdale has both Bill Leard and Joe Dalley as big league timber, both men being in demand in the big show. If he could complete his contract for these two players he would be able to pick up some of the money he has dropped this season.

James Russell, Lowell, said that he have dropped a nice little wad. One or two other clubs, especially Tacoma, can dispose of players at this stage of the season.
