GEARHART COTTAGES OPENING

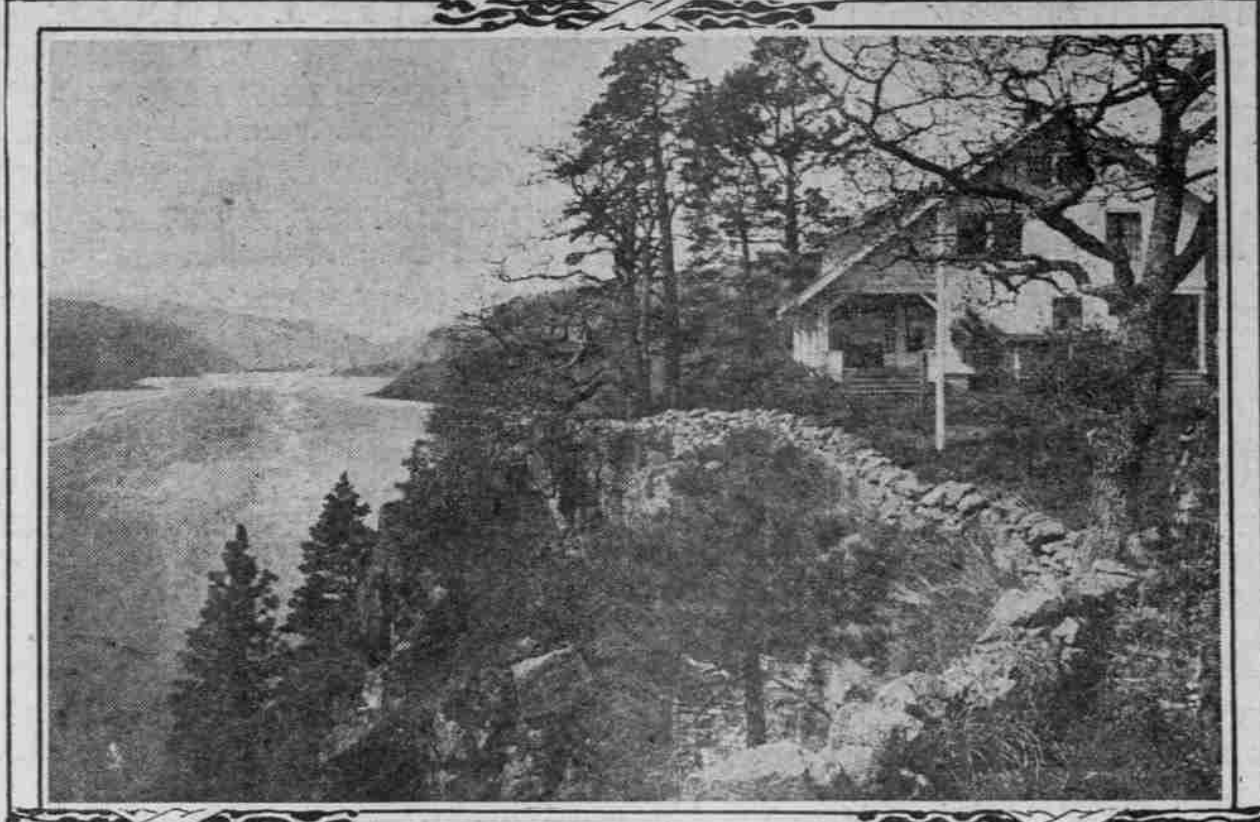
Golf Links Lure Players and Kids—dolls Enjoy New Firebell.

GEARHART, Or., July 7.—(Special.)—Cottagers are coming into this resort with such a rush that the little town-by-the-sea is bustling with activity. Houses are being remodeled, painted and bedecked in gala attire to receive the incoming throng of merry-makers.

The golf links are most alluring with the springy turf, the multi-colored sweaters of the women, against the vivid green of the links making a delightful and pleasing contrast. According to the trade-folk and those in charge of the park, there are 50 per cent more cottages now open than at this time last year.
