"It may seem to be something that has been often said, but I'm glad to be back to Portland," Miss Cohen said. "New York is all right, of course—that is where a good part of my musical future is—but home is home. In the Summer time, I almost wept when, on the homeward journey, I caught sight of the Columbia River and then old Mount Hood, snow-capped."

Miss Cohen has been studying vocalism with the celebrated Byford Ryan, the voice coach, in New York City, and she has had lessons from him every day.
