former proposal was accepted. These were probably the highest fees ever offered any choir society under similar conditions although for the choir's own management, the most notable of which was the series of 1912 in Buffalo, New York and Boston. The choir had been proposed to sing in Boston, en route to England in 1915. Were Bach's eight-part unaccompanied Motets, "Sing Ye to the Lord," the choral part of the "Winter Symphony," selections from Bach's "B Minor Mass," and Verdi's "Requiem," and several smaller unaccompanied works. During its 20 years of active existence the choir appeared in 73 concerts, 62 of which were given in Massey Hall, Toronto, Canada, and in Carnegie Hall, New York, one in Symphony Hall, Boston, six in Elmwood Music Hall, Buffalo, two in Gray's Armory, Cleveland, and three in Orchestra Hall, Chicago.

NEW RESORT IS READY

RIVERSIDE PARK, ON WILLAMETTE, TO OPEN TODAY.

Swimming and Bathing Facilities Extensive—Dancing Will Be Held. Special Concerts Announced.

With big crowds present at the informal opening of Riverside Park, the "wonder spot" of the Willamette, yesterday, many thousands are expected to take part in the grand opening today.

Portland's new and beautiful outdoor amusement resort has the promise of being one of the most popular of the city. There are the best of swimming and bathing facilities to attract persons aquatically inclined, while there will be dancing every evening and Sunday afternoons.

Today a concert of the programme for the afternoon and again for the evening. The famous Crotillon and Riverside Park orchestras will offer the main attraction.

Situated by the very banks of the Willamette at one of the river's most scenic spots, Riverside Park is a place for real recreation. Refreshments are served on the extensive verandas which overlook the river. The outdoor pavilion is equally attractive.

Everywhere baths have been carefully worked out. The popular park promise to become a reality. Mr. Ringler already has started to accept reservations for club outings and picnics. No charge of admission is made and automobile parking and boat landing are free.

Many took the opportunity yesterday to make the trip by boat up the scenic Willamette, while many others came by automobile. The Oregon City and Milwaukie cars were crowded.

Today preparations have been made to accommodate the largest crowds ever to attend the opening of a Portland amusement resort.

Y. W. C. A. Notes.

THE commission on training camp activities appointed by the Secretary of War has asked the National Board of the Young Women's Christian Association to furnish expert women workers with girls to act as advisers to the commission in the neighborhood of training camps.

This organization is naturally the one to which the community may turn in time of emergency. The Young Women's Christian Association has the machinery, the equipment and the motive to make this work effective, and a women's war council has been organized by the National Y. W. C. A. board to carry out work along this and other lines.

Miss Frances Gare, a former Y. W. C. A. Northwestern field worker, now in charge of a girls' school in Turkey, has during the past few years passed through some very thrilling experiences. In a recent letter she says: "Miss Willard (her assistant) and I made a composite tour of the world, a building connected with the largest of the girls' school buildings. The schoolgirls, 55 in all, saw three hours each day for the past few years. The thousand pieces, new and mended articles, are turned over to the hospitals. The city women are helped through relief work supplied to them in their homes. They spin wool and make stockings; weave wool and cotton cloth; make lace and embroidery. The stockings are given to the hospitals. Living conditions are hard in the city and food is high. A pair of shoes costs \$20 and native things in proportion.

"Four thousand sick soldiers are in the city, 2000 on the premises near where we are working. There is no every kind of contagious disease, but we have escaped them all."

Association of Collegiate Alumnae Aids Troops.

War Service Committee Is Appointed by Portland Women for Welfare Work.

THE interest shown by the members of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae in patriotic work is being demonstrated all over the United States. This past week the Portland women appointed a war service committee to keep in touch with the general plan of the National organization. Official bulletins are issued frequently.

An excellent suggestion regarding training camps comes from Mrs. Percy Bolster, leader of the branch of the association, who has been appointed chairman of a committee of that branch "to bring a healthful influence to the camps by providing clubhouses and homes outside the camps."

Mrs. Bolster, who is a Boston University woman, has four other women on her committee to instruct in the camps by providing clubhouses and homes outside the camps.

Each home will be provided for by a separate college group, either alumnae or under-graduates, or both, and each will have a college master. For instance, a Radcliffe home will have a Radcliffe mother and all her assistants will be Radcliffe. The college mother will be permanent or as nearly so as possible, but the helpers may vary from week to week. All the women in a group or unit can help in this way. A few will give their services in the camps, and others will be in the city, doing things that are needed there to make it attractive—furnishings, games, books, Victor records.

This plan has been submitted to Joseph Leach, the committee on training of the Council of National Defense, and has received his enthusiastic approval. He has written Mrs. Bolster and is going to it as quickly as possible, and she is now engaged in finding suitable houses at Ayer, where a large camp is to be established.

Such an undertaking seems particularly fitting at this time, when the country is in need of training camps, made up as they are of large numbers of college men, and other branches of the service. The college mothers and their assistants can be worked out to advantage in connection with the camps in the line of instruction.

A problem of hardly less importance than the training of the college mothers is the problem of the college men who are stationed either permanently or temporarily. The executive committee suggests one way of coping with this problem in communities likely to be "shocked."

Our schools are now releasing from service a large number of teachers who would be exceptionally well fitted to safeguard the morals of girls and to make them realize the danger in consorting with soldiers who are often near or close to the college through their towns. Branches could interest teachers to take up this work. Clubs could be formed for war service, neighborhood groups that would take in all the girls of a community, and at the meetings the instructions

Most Immediate Demand Is for Completion of List Required for University of Oregon Base Hospital Unit.

THE Red Cross nursing service is appealing to the graduate nurses of Oregon to enroll for duty with the Base Hospital unit and for the emergency detachment.

The most immediate demand is for members to complete the list of 65 nurses required for the University of Oregon Base Hospital unit. Even though numbers have sent in applications during the past month, the unit is far from complete. To be eligible for the unit, a nurse must pass a physical examination after having been accepted into the Red Cross service and also become immunized against typhoid, diphtheria and tetanus.
