Drafts and Certificates of Deposits Also Out.

\$10,000,000 REVENUE LOST

Senator Gore Offers Amendment Designed to Limit Number of American Soldiers Sent Abroad.

Parcel Post Tax Retained.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 .- In dispos-WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—In disposing of minor disputes in the war tax bill the Senate today, by a vote of 38 to 22, struck out the provision inserted by the finance committee for a 1-cent stamp on bank checks, drafts and certificates of deposit, designed to raise \$10,000,000 in revenue.

A tribute to the late Senator Kern was then paid by Senator New and upon his motion the Senate then recessed until Monday.

An amendment to prevent expending any money raised from the bill in transporting men to Europe who have not volunteered for such service was introduced by Senator Gore. The Oklahoma Senator said his object was to conserve American man power. He declared that the total number of men of draft ages in all the allied countries is nearly equal to the total population of Germany and that there was no dearth in man power among the European countries now at war with the central powers.

"What we need is not men, but munitions, arms, weapons and supplies,"

he said.

The amendment was passed over without action. An amendment by Senator Underwood, of Alabama, providing that war increases in postage rates shall not be the basis of increasing any postmaster's compensation was adopted.

On the first rollcall, taken on the bill the Senate retained, 28 to 27, the committee's provision for a 1-cent stamp tax on transportation of parcel post packages amended so as to ex-empt packages costing under 25 cents. For each additional 25 cents charged, a further 1-cent tax would be imposed. From the parcel post tax \$2,000,000 in gevenue is estimated.

ARIZONA SHERIFF JUSTIFIES DE-PORTATION FROM BISBEE.

Governor Campbell Receives Information of Incident, but Course Is Not Yet Announced.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 18.—The re-port of Attorney-General Jones on the deportation of alleged I. W. W. mem-bers and sympathizers from Bisbee on bers and sympatitizers from Bisbee on July 12 was placed in Governor Camp-bell's hands today. The report was extensive and consisted largely of statements of residents of the Warren district, including Sheriff Wheeler, of Cochise County, and Mayor Erickson, of Bisbee. It made no recommenda-

what course he will take.

Sheriff Wheeler's report, which was included in that of the Attorney-General, declares that 'I would repeat the operation any time if I found my own people endangered by a mob of aliens and enemies of my Government, and . . . I intend when deserted by all other departments who should said and other departments who should aid and protect, yet who do not, to protect my own people by the best possible meth-ods and in the most effective way. I pursued the only course that promised freedom from bloodshed and anarchy."

H. E. Plummer is chief of this bureau and it will be the next one chief of this bureau and in all probability he and Mr. Barbur will confer on proposed reductions of force within a few days.

AUTO IS NOT CONTRABAND

Importation of Liquor in Machine Does Not Warrant Confiscation.


