

WEATHER CONDITIONS. The evening map shows the highest ba-rometric preasure central at Prince Albert in Southern Canada, but smaller centers are off the coast from Eureka, Cal., and Tri-angle Island. The only marked center of depression was over Arizona. Rains have occurred pretty generally in most sections of the United States during the last 24 hours, the only exceptions being the Southern Rocky Mountain and Southern Plateau re-gions and California. In many cases the showers were light, but St. Louis reports 1.50 inches and Duluth ,50 inch in the last 24 hours.
