

# SECOND LIBERTY LOAN APPORTIONED

What Is Expected of Various Districts Made Known by Directors.

## OFFICIALS ARE HOPEFUL

Two-Thirds of Bond Issue Is Expected to Go to New York, Boston, Cleveland and Chicago Districts.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—Treasury officials tonight announced the apportionment of the second liberty bond issue, to be offered next Monday, among the various Federal reserve districts. Virtually two-thirds of the loan is expected to be raised by the New York, Boston, Cleveland and Chicago districts.

Apportionments indicate only what each district is expected to do, and may be entirely upset, as in the case of the first liberty loan, by the actual subscriptions. In making the apportionment officials used two bases of subscriptions—the minimum of \$3,000,000, and an "expected amount" of \$5,000,000,000.

Apparently in offering the second issue officials hope to realize a \$5,000,000,000 response.

In such cases the apportionment reads: "The amount has been computed on the percentage basis, and while the banking resources of each district—that is, the total resources of the National banks, state banks, and trust companies—have been given large consideration, other factors have been taken into account, such as the income tax collected from each district, the assessed value of property therein, the subscriptions received from each district to the first liberty loan, and the amount of bonds allotted on such subscriptions, the capital available for bond investment in each district and its population."

The basis of apportionment thus varies materially from that used in the first liberty loan, when the banking resources of each Federal Reserve district were the sole basis of calculation. Apportionment by states, easy of computation in the first issue, cannot be determined except by Treasury experts in the second offering. It is likely that such apportionments will be announced shortly.

## MAYOR CURL VETERAN

ALBANY MAN TO BE HONORED BY PYTHIANS.

Second Grand Lodge Veteran's Jewel Ever Issued in Oregon Will Be Given at Annual Meeting.

ALBANY, Or., Sept. 29.—(Special).—When Mayor Curl attends the annual convention of the Grand Lodge of the Knights of Pythias of Oregon in Portland on October 3 it will be the 23d time he has attended a session of the Grand Lodge without missing a session. Mr. Curl, who is a past grand chancellor of Oregon and a past supreme representative to the Supreme Lodge, has attended more consecutive sessions of the Grand Lodge than any living member. He first attended the Grand Lodge of Oregon in 1894.

William M. Calk, of Portland, ex-

County Judge of Multnomah County, who is also a past grand chancellor and past supreme representative, and J. W. Maloney, of Pendleton, ex-County Judge of Umatilla County, who is a past grand chancellor of Oregon and who for many years has served as grand master of the exchequer of the Grand Lodge, rank close to Mayor Curl, as the coming meeting will be the 23d consecutive session for each of them. Both attended the Grand Lodge for the first time in 1893.

Mayor Curl will receive the second Grand Lodge veteran's jewel, which typifies 25 years' continuous attendance at the Grand Lodge sessions, ever issued in Oregon. By a singular coincidence it was a member of Mr. Curl's own lodge, Laurel Lodge, No. 1, of this city, who received the first in this state. The recipient of this honor was George W. Hochstedler, for many years a resident of Albany, who died a few years ago at his home in Portland.

OREGON CITY, Or., Sept. 29.—(Special).—Oregon City is proud of her two boys who have just left the naval training station in California for Harvard, where they have been sent by the Government to take a special course in wireless telegraphy. These two young men are Arthur Mattley, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Mattley, and Eldon Aldredge, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Aldredge. These young men enlisted at the first call of Uncle Sam.

## GREENE'S SON IS AIDE

CAMP LEWIS COMMANDER PAID SIGNAL HONOR.

5000 Rookies Take First Plunge in Cold Waters of American as Part of "Hardening" Process.

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 29.—The War Department has paid Major-General Greene, commander of Camp Lewis, the compliment of permitting his son, Captain James R. Greene, Sixth United States Cavalry, to serve as his aide de camp. Captain Greene is now stationed at Sierra Blanca, on the Mexican border.

Five thousand recruits of the new National Army Thursday plunged into the cold waters of American Lake as a part of their regular drill. The cold plunge and a long hike afterwards is a part of the hardening process which is expected to fit them for the rigors of campaigning in France.

Lieutenant-Colonel C. H. Miller, inspector-general, has arrived at Camp Lewis and has been assigned as camp inspector.

General Greene has granted authority for the inter-regimental relay race Thanksgiving day and will provide a message for the runners to carry to Mayor Fawcett, of Tacoma. It is proposed to have nine regimental 25-men teams.

First Lieutenants O'Connell and Noble have arrived from Fort Sill, Okla., as instructors in field fortifications and bayonet work. Other officers will arrive shortly for instruction in musketry, machine gun, automatic rifles and grenade work. The bayonet instructors were trained 12 hours a day for a month at Fort Sill. They taught the English method with American modifications, which is expected to be most effective in hand-to-hand fighting.

## PRESIDENT'S AID ASKED

REQUEST THAT MILLS ADOPT EIGHT-HOUR DAY URGED.

Prominent Seattle Man Telegraphs Mr. Wilson He Believes Western Operators Would Reel Executive.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Sept. 2.—Senator Poinsette today laid before the President a telegram received from Seattle voicing the opinion that the larger lumber mills of Seattle and Tacoma, if requested by the President, would establish the eight-hour day. The President did not give the suggestion, but told the Senator he would turn the telegram over to the Labor Adjustment Board and ask that Board to consider the proposition when it opens hearings at Seattle October 8. The telegram is as follows:

"I have reliable inside information that leads me to believe that a request direct from the President to the mills hereafter named asking them as a patriotic duty to go to the eight-hour day would meet with prompt response. I believe the mills are looking for and would welcome an opportunity such as this to grant the eight-hour day."

"All negotiations now pending between the Government and laboring men on Puget Sound would be greatly facilitated. I believe also that retirement of the lumber situation will go a long way toward adjusting all other labor difficulties in this section."

"I am credibly informed that owing to local conditions in Seattle and Tacoma the going to an eight-hour day would work no hardship upon the mill-owners." The telegram then named most of the large lumber mills of Seattle and Tacoma.

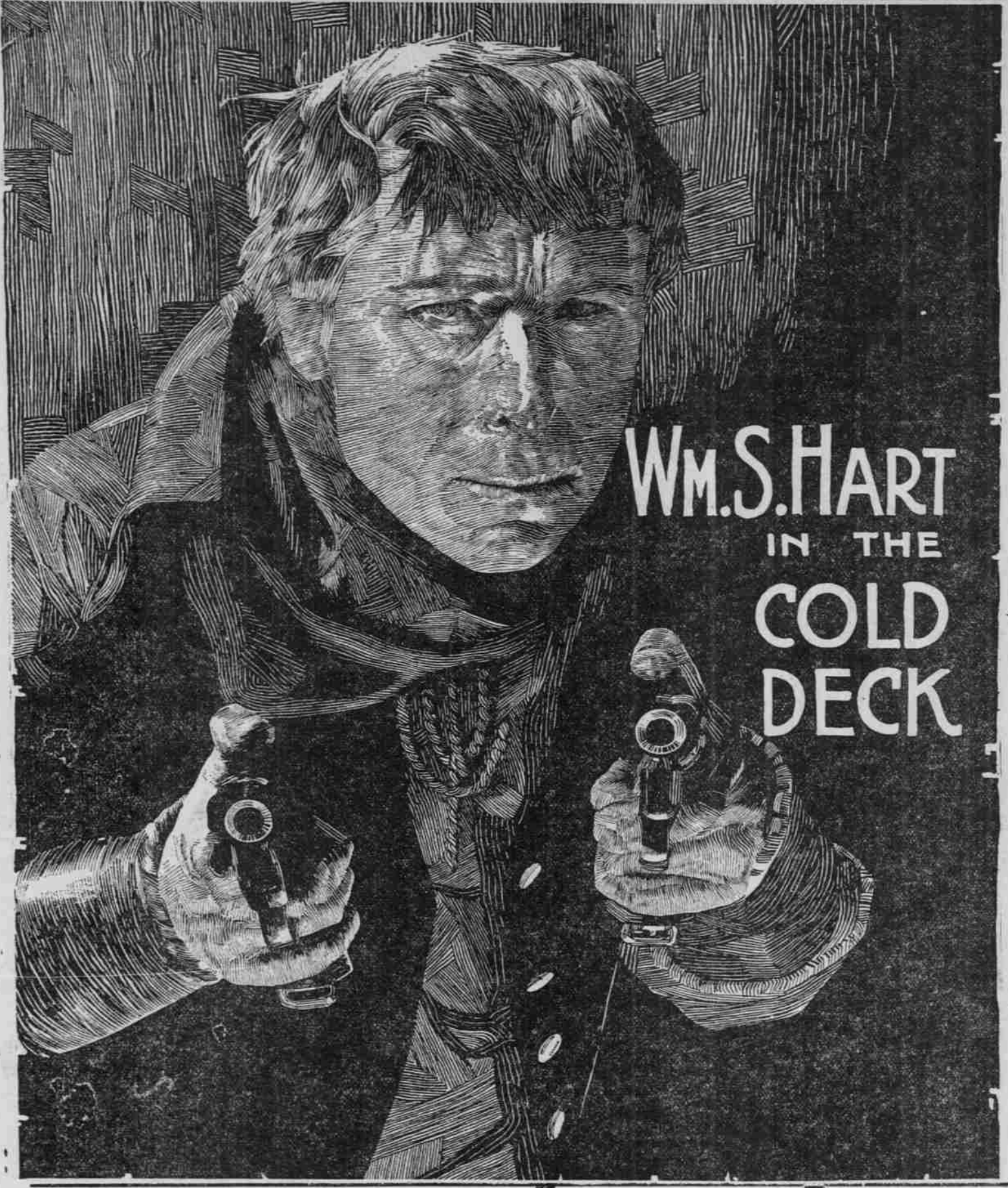
