Five ARE READY FOR SEA
YOUNG MEN FINISH WORK REQUIRED IN NAUTICAL SCHOOL.

Licenses to Be Issued to New Junior Officer Material—Others to Be Examined Soon.

Mace Leedham and Robert Whitby, of Astoria, third mates, Alvin D. Thompson and Lee L. Wallace, second mates, and Frank F. Taylor, third mate, all of Portland.

That is the roll of nautical school graduates in the state of Oregon since the Government established classes at Portland and Astoria for training men to man the future American merchant marine. The men graduated have passed examinations before Captain E. Edwards, United States Inspector of Hulls for this district, and their licenses will be issued this week.

When the licenses are issued the men will also sign cards that are to be forwarded to Director Howard at Boston, in charge of the United States Shipping Board's campaign, deck and engine-room officers, and become a part of an elaborate index system. Men will be assigned to ships from Mr. Howard's office and will be notified of their homes when they are to report for duty.

Dr. Williams, in charge of the Portland school, says there will be more men this week or early next week to present themselves for examination before Captain Edwards. Most of the graduates, he says, display ability, their previous sea experience having given them a practical advantage.

Assistance is being lent by some outside agencies in the study of astronomy, and N. F. Titus, who has studied that science, has given the men many pointers. Dr. Williams plans to have some of the former masters of deep-water vessels residing here appear before the students and explain some of the minor sailing problems, also relate their early experiences aboard ship, which might be calculated to steer the new officers away from troubles.

FEDERAL AID IS WANTED
CALIFORNIA OFFICERS LAX, SAYS MR. EVANS.

District Attorney Will Appeal to Senator Chamberlain to Force Co-operation.

Unable to get the desired co-operation of Federal authorities in California in their efforts to prevent the continued wholesale importation of liquor into this state, District Attorney Evans, following conferences with United States Attorney Reames and Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday, said he would appeal to United States Senator Chamberlain or the Attorney-General's office at Washington.

"The United States Attorney's office and Sheriff Hurlburt are co-operating with my office in every possible way to put an end to bootlegging operations in this state," said Mr. Evans yesterday, "but it seems impossible for us to enlist the necessary aid from the Federal authorities in California. Without that assistance from the shipping point, it is impossible for us to get the results we seek."

Mr. Evans pointed out that the officers handling the situation in Portland no sooner discover one disguise under which liquor is imported and a stop to that particular method than the shippers devise an equally clever scheme, which requires time to detect.

SAFE PASSAGE IS MADE
Forestry Engineers in France, Officer's Wife Advised.

First information of the safe arrival in France of the Tenth Regiment Engineers, Forestry, composed of Portland and Oregon men, was received Friday by cable by Mrs. Noel A. Dew, 215 North Twentieth street, whose husband, Lieutenant Dew, is with the regiment.

The regiment left Washington, D. C., about a month ago. They left Portland July 12 and since leaving the country no word had been received from them. Lieutenant Dew was formerly associated with George M. Cornwall in the Timberman. He has received two promotions since joining the regiment, first being promoted to battalion sergeant and later to second lieutenant. He is one of the designated French interpreters with the regiment.

NEW COURSE WILL OPEN

SOCIAL RELIEF WORKERS TO BE TRAINED AT REED.

Branch of Red Cross Activity Open to Entire State—Lectures Will Extend Six Weeks.

The Red Cross institute for training members for social relief work in Oregon will open on October 15 at Reed College, under the direction of the Portland branch of the Red Cross. The American Red Cross Society is organizing these institutes in a few of the larger cities and applicants from all parts of the state are invited to train at the Portland division. Not more than 25 persons will be admitted for the work. These will be selected by Victor Johnson, director of the civilian relief work in Portland.

The members admitted will be required to give their full time to the work during the period of training, with a promise to volunteer a half of their time to this service after the course is completed. It is the aim of the course to prepare the members for home social service and teach them to administer to the needs of the families of the soldiers. Reed College has been asked to take charge of the institute by Director Stinson, of Seattle, division director of the Red Cross.

The period of training will be arranged into two divisions, one to be spent in practical field work in Portland and the other in lectures at Reed College. The lectures will be comprised of four lectures a week, to be extended through six weeks. Paul H. Douglass, of the economics and sociology department, has been selected as director of the institute and will take charge of all the lectures, most of which will be given by him.

During the six weeks of training each morning will be spent in practical field work and each afternoon in lectures or a study of the social service. In connection with the lectures all of the members will have the use of the college library and will undertake a thorough study of the work in sociology and economics.

The institute programme is arranged to cover a wide field and to give efficient training to the members during the weeks spent. Not only members from Portland, but from other parts of the state, will enter the course and in this way a working force among the Red Cross for field work in Oregon will be organized.

WAR MOTHERS' WELCOMED BY FOOD DIRECTOR HOOVER.
Parents of Sons in Any Branch of Nation's Fighting Forces Asked to Do Special Work.

Plans for organization of the various units for food conservation are developing rapidly here, details have been arranged at the office of W. B. Ayer, Federal administrator for Oregon. The present activity centers around "War Mothers," who are to be called upon for a special work.

Mr. Ayer Friday received the following from Washington, D. C., concerning the National scope of the plan: "War mothers are organizing in every state to assist during the week of October 21-28 in the home-to-home drive to obtain signatures to the United States food administration. The plan contemplates enlisting the services of every woman who has a son in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps or a son enrolled under the selective service law and subject to future call."

It is peculiarly fitting that the mothers of the men who are to fight the Nation's battles should enlist in this vitally essential service. They are sending their sons forth to the supreme test of citizenship. They want their sons to return to them as soon as the peace or victory may be achieved. They will hasten the coming of that peace by the work they have undertaken.

"In no war which the Nation has engaged have the loyalty, devotion and self-sacrifice of American women ever failed. In no other war have they had a greater opportunity for service, which is offered in the movement for conservation of the Nation's food supplies."
