

GERMANS BEATEN BACK HALF MILE

Northward Along Passchendaele Ridge Victorious British Force Their Way.

OBJECTIVES ALL GAINED

Attack Begins at 6:05 A. M. in Rain, Which Had Been Falling All Night—Heavy Machine Gun Fire Is Encountered.

BRITISH FRONT IN BELGIUM, Nov. 10.—British troops in their attack on the Passchendaele ridge, today, reached an extreme depth of 800 yards on a 3500-yard front. They not only attained their objectives, but some of their troops have even gone beyond them to the north along Passchendaele ridge.

The British passed many strongly fortified farms north and northwest of Goeborg. At this point they were fighting nearly half a mile from their jumping-off place.

The line was pushed northward along the Passchendaele ridge almost to the point at which the highest crest starts sloping downward. Today's operations were carried out on a 3500-yard front for limited objectives, which had been virtually all gained by 10 o'clock.

The attack was begun at 6:05 and in the rain which had been falling nearly all night. The ground along the crest of the ridge was in comparatively good condition for the advance, but to the westward, in the valley of Paddelbeck, it was exceedingly marshy.

Despite the vile going on the lower ground, the troops here appear to have kept up with the progress of the more fortunate men on the higher ground. As early as 7:30 o'clock they were battling at a fortified farm 500 yards beyond their starting point, and shortly afterward were reported some distance beyond this place.

The German artillery put down a heavy barrage all along the front involved as the attack was begun. The British also encountered a heavy machine-gun fire from numerous strong points.

If the British remain in the positions they reached this morning it will mean that the salient about Passchendaele and Goeborg has been greatly widened and, therefore, made more satisfactory.

FRENCH REPULSE GERMANS

Fighting Spirited Northwest of Rheims and on Verdun Front.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—Northwest of Rheims the battle was marked by a series of efforts directed by the enemy against French trenches and small posts, especially in the sectors of Lorraine, Coudun and the sectors of the Meuse. The French repulsed the German attack at any point.

East of Neuville French forces penetrated a German trench and destroyed shelters. On the right bank of the Meuse (Verdun front), the artillery fighting continues spiritedly near Chaume Wood, where in patrol engagements we took prisoners.

In the Vosges and in Alsace the French troops inflicted considerable losses in raiding enemy lines north-west of Senones and east of Sappol. German aviators last night dropped bombs on a French hospital at Zuydcoote, department of the Nord, killing seven persons and wounding nine. Dunkirk was again bombarded, six casualties resulting.

At the Nation's Capital.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Plans for continuing the liberty loan financing between periods of intense campaigns, through disposal of bonds by banks and other large purchasers to individuals who have not already subscribed to the extent of their ability have been formed by the governors of the 12 district reserve banks in conference with Secretary McAdoo and the Federal Reserve Board.

As one detail of a comprehensive scheme for preparing the Nation to absorb other war loans, the reserve banks will be urged to hold by deposit of liberty bonds now held by them, trying particularly to place them with farmers. The governors suggested that the Government maintain an active publicity system to emphasize the need of bond-buying by persons of small means.

The governors were virtually unanimous in declaring that the \$4,617,000, 000 subscriptions to the second loan were made without straining the financial resources of the country.

W. W. Armstrong, fuel administrator for Utah, has been put in charge of coal distribution in Washington, Colorado, Oregon, Nevada, Idaho and Utah. He is authorized to call on surrounding coal mines and districts in New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming and Montana for coal to meet the emergency needs of the territory of which he is in charge. In drawing on these districts for coal, Mr. Armstrong is authorized to take 10 per cent of their output except that in no instance shall it exceed the allotment which went to his territory from the districts in 1916.

Admiral Sims cables that some of the loss of American lives in the unsuccessful submarine attack on the transport Finland was due to the unauthorized lowering of boats. The body of Newton R. Hunt, seaman, who was drowned, was picked up by the patrol boat Alcedo, afterwards torpedoed and lost. The other two seamen lost were James W. Henry and Porter Hilton.

BRITISH COMMANDER VICTORIOUS AT HEAD OF FORCES IN PALESTINE.

TURKS' LOSS HEAVY

British Army in Palestine Makes Further Gains.

CASUALTIES REACH 10,000

Number of Guns Captured Is More Than 70—Askalon Has Been Occupied by English Infantry and Artillery.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The British army in Palestine pursuing the defeated Turks has made further extensive gains, the War Office announces. Askalon has been occupied.

The Turkish casualties exclusive of prisoners are 10,000. The number of guns captured has been increased to more than 70.

The communication follows: "General Allenby reports that yesterday mounted troops moved forward rapidly and captured another 400 prisoners and 10 guns. Our line now runs in a southeasterly direction from two miles north of Hamamah, which is two miles from the coast and four miles northeast of Askalon, to two miles north of Ask-el-Menshiyeh on the Central Railway. This line is generally 10 to six miles north of the Wadi-Hesru River. Askalon has been occupied by infantry and artillery."

The British column which is advancing along the Mediterranean coast, assisted by French and British warships, has gained nearly 20 miles since the recent capture of Gaza. Hamamah is 15 miles above Gaza. The British are now only about five miles below the latitude of Jerusalem, which, however, is 45 miles inland and has not thus far been reached directly.

HUMBERT SHOWS RECEIPT

Expenditure of Money Received From Bolo Pasha Explained.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—The Senatorial committee appointed to examine the demand to authorize legal proceedings against Senator Charles Humbert, owner of the Paris Journal, decided today to ask the Senate tomorrow to vote suspension of Humbert's immunity.

Senator Humbert wrote the committee explaining how he had employed the 43,650 francs which Bolo Pasha, under arrest for espionage, accused him of keeping.

Senator Humbert, enclosing receipts for the money, asked the committee to approve the suspension of immunity. Fernand Monier, president of the Paris Court of Appeals, for misuse of his office, has been condemned to dismissal. Monier was a friend of Bolo Pasha.

Albany Merger Is Planned.

ALBANY, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special.)—The Albany Retail Merchants' Association probably will merge with the Albany Commercial Club in the near future, instead of maintaining a separate organization and officers, and will be operated merely as a branch of the club.

This action has been determined upon by the members of the association, and by a committee consisting of F. M. French, J. R. Hulbert and G. A. Flood was named to effect the merger.

Prominent Educators Procured.

ALBANY, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special.)—Several leading educators of the state have been secured as instructors in the annual Teachers' Institute of Linn and Benton counties, which will be held in

this city November 26, 27 and 28. Among them are P. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon; L. R. Alderman, superintendent of the Portland schools; J. A. Churchill, State Superintendent of Public Instruction; J. H. Ackerman, president of the Oregon State Normal School, and M. S. Pittman, of the State Normal School.

Harrisburg Ferry May Be Replaced.

ALBANY, Or., Nov. 10.—(Special.)—The ferry across the Willamette River at Harrisburg, which is the only ferry on the Pacific Highway in Oregon, may be replaced by a bridge next summer. The County Court of Linn County announced today it is ready to build its

half of the bridge, and if the court of Lane County takes the same view the structure will be erected in 1918.
