

SAMMY PREDICTS FEDERAL CONTROL

Men at Camp Lewis Impatient
With Unsettled Labor
Conditions.

SOLDIERS DEMAND BACKING

Telephone Strike Points Way to
Speeding Up of Production of
Ships, Copper, Lumber and
Other Materials of War.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 17.—(Special.)—When will everybody get to work and give us something to fight with?

That is the question that National Army men at Camp Lewis are asking. While they are ready and eager to give their lives for democracy, civilians are impeding work in the mines, in the forests, in the shipyards, every place where their efforts should be bent towards furthering the cause of the United States. But the men at camp see a change coming.

They expect the Government to take a hand shortly and force the issue. Accustomed as they have become to military discipline, they believe that the Government will step in and see that they have something to fight with; that traitors to the country will be punished and that every industry will be speeded up to meet war conditions.

Action Is Demanded.

Men who worked in the copper mines of the Coeur d'Alene district of Idaho and in Butte have watched the mining game closely. Those from the seacoast have kept their eye on the ship-building plants and the forests from where the Douglas fir for the bottoms is cut. They want to know why some men can stay off the job, practice sabotage and pursue a policy of hindrance and destruction while they train at Camp Lewis to go over the top. They feel that they have an explanation coming. They want action, not words, but if the action is not forthcoming they are desirous of knowing the reason why.

Mind you, these men are all workers, union men for the most part, who have no particular sympathy with the employer. No men would detest doing strike duty like they in fact, many of them believe that large corporations have given the workmen the worst of the deal. They are strong for the point that eight hours shall constitute a day's work, and most of them are for the closed shop.

But they are dead set against the crowd they know as the Wobblies. Many of them bristled when the 10-hour day in the lumber mills was mentioned. They thought it was an effort to grind the workmen. What they want is a square deal for every man, employer and employee alike. They are certain of one thing, however, they want every worker to step back in the harness and give the National Army support.

Way Out Seen.

They do see a way out. It is Government direction of industries. The telephone strike has demonstrated the advisability that action to them more clearly than anything else. Especially is this true when they have been unable to get points away from the camp because of inadequate service. Service in camp, where the lines are under Army control, is perfect.

"Old Uncle Sam will stand the gaff about just so long and then he will hop in and run the game himself," remarked a non-com. "He can stand a little of that kind of thing and is long suffering, but he will kick when the whole business and then will handle the job all by his lonesome."

Many of the soldiers believe that is the only solution of the vexatious labor problem. They urge action, for they are peevish over delays. They believe that many workmen will not be satisfied until the Government does take a bit of direct action on its own hook. At the same time they feel that the men who are holding out are not the workmen of the country who honestly want to better their condition, but the crowd of dissatisfied idlers who make a living by making trouble.

PACKERS ASKED FOR LIFT

Slaughter-House Workmen Want 10
Hours' Pay for 8 Hours.

SIoux CITY, Ia., Nov. 17.—Ten hours' pay for eight hours' work and other concessions have been demanded by the 42,000 union employees of the meat packing plants in the United States, and the demands already have been presented to the packers in Chicago, according to announcement by officers of the Sioux City Union of Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen.

Failure of the packers to grant the demands imposed probably will not result in a strike, owing to conditions that the war has created, it is asserted.

CANNIBALS YET LIVE

Castle Rock Missionaries Tell
of Work in Congo.

TWO ELEPHANTS BAGGED

Missionary Preached, Taught,
Trained Carpenters, Bricklayers,
Engineers, Captained Steamer
Oregon on Congo River.

CASTLE ROCK, Wash. Nov. 17.—(Special.)—Rev. Everett R. Moon and Mrs. Moon have returned from their second term of service in the Belgian Congo, where they were about five years ago as missionaries to Belenge, a mission station of the Disciples of Christ, 800 miles from the mouth of the Congo River and with two miles of Stanley's post at Equaville.

Mr. Moon helped build a church to 2000 members, taught in the Belenge Bible College, had charge of the industrial work of the mission, training carpenters, bricklayers and engineers. There were about 15 white persons at the mission, seven men from the Government post. He spent much time as captain of the mission steamer Oregon, which plied up and down the Congo and its numerous branches.

Last year, in company with three other missionaries, Mr. Moon traveled about 3000 miles in making missionary surveys into new territory. More than half of the distance was traveled

25,000 Canceled Stamps Used in Coat-of-Arms.

Aberdeen Woman Makes Eagle,
Spears and Shield From Collection
Amassed in 25 Years.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Nov. 11.—(Special.)—Twenty-five thousand canceled postage stamps, gathered over a period of 25 years and representing 13 different administrations, have been used by Mrs. Sarah Erickson to make a picture of a Government coat of arms. This is a picture of an American eagle with outspread wings and below it five spears and a shield.

Three of the stamps were issued in the first administration of George Washington. Portland Eagles are said to have offered Mrs. Erickson \$200 for her work, but the offer has been refused. Mrs. Erickson is still gathering stamps, especially those of old date, for the purpose of completing the work. Addition of the words "Liberty" and "E Pluribus Unum" is needed to finish the picture.

APPLES UNUSUALLY LARGE
