Highway to Be Hard-Surfaced.

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Clatsop County is to open bids on January 31 for the laying of three miles of hard-surfaced road, completing the permanent improvement of the highway from Astoria to Fort Stevens. The improvement will include about 19,000 yards of grading and 30,000 yards of pavement and will cost from \$75,000 to \$80,000.
