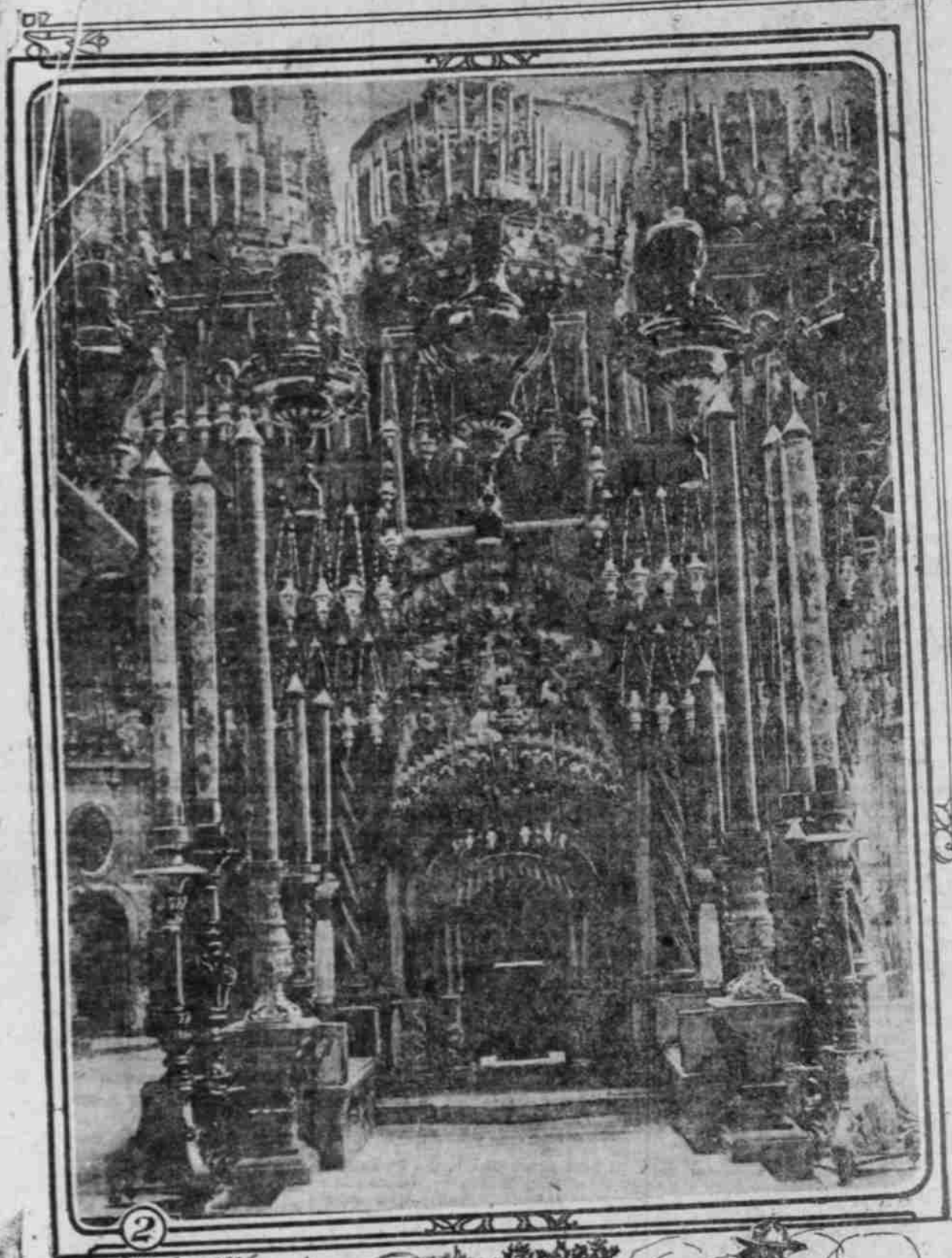
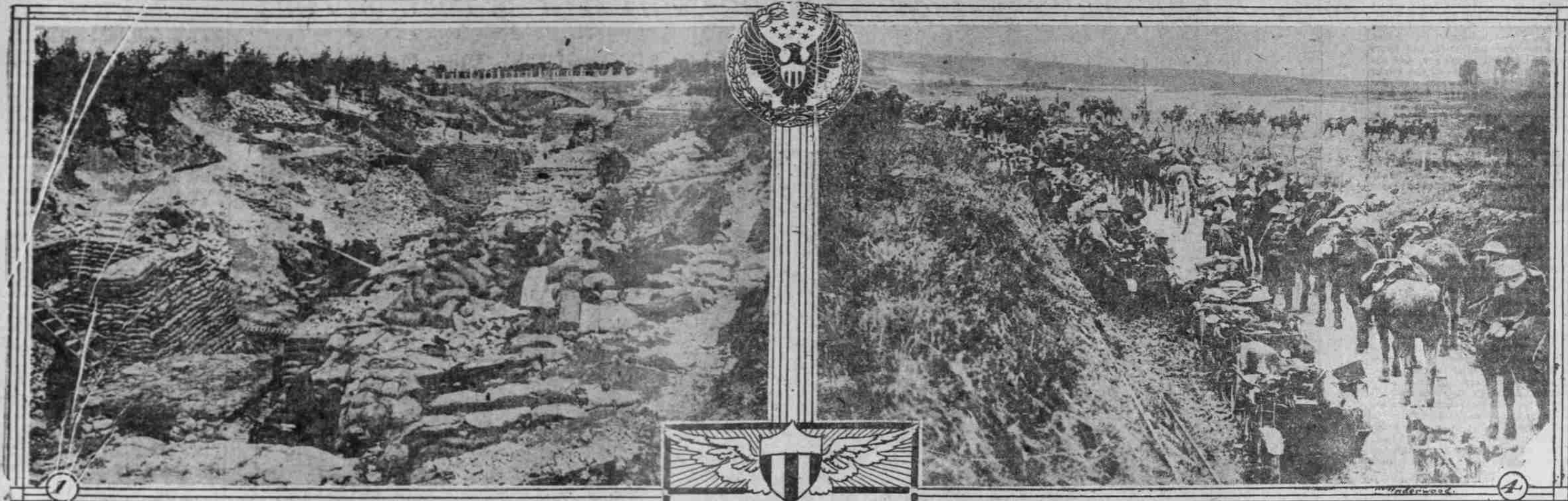


EVENTS OF WORLD-WIDE INTEREST ARE PICTURED BY CAMERA

Turks Accused of Carrying Away Famous Treasures From Jerusalem—German Officers' Quarters Back of Hindenburg Line Luxuriously Furnished.



GERMAN officers, confident to the extreme in the impregnability of the Hindenburg line to withstand any attacks, went to the trouble of having prisoners of war build luxurious dugouts 20 and 30 feet below the surface of the earth. This line of dugouts, covered with sandbags, in a sunken road, was captured by the British in their recent advance on the western front.

The dugouts were lavishly furnished in first-class style, almost as modern as a hotel in a large city. All modern improvements were installed in the dugouts, which were safe from all bombs and shells.

The British blew up these lavish dugouts in their advance.

An official dispatch received from France says that the Turks before surrendering Jerusalem to the British carried off the famous treasures of the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, valued at millions of dollars, and sent to Berlin the church's celebrated treasury of brilliant.

Christian priests were mistreated, and Father Picardo, an Italian priest, is said to have died from the effects of Turkish brutality.

Trenches and communication trenches are no respecters of roads, so when a road gets in the way the trench cuts right across it. Of course, even the presence of a trench cannot be permitted to interrupt the smooth flow of traffic along the road, so the trench must be bridged over.

Its ruined buildings will be a monument forever to German Kultur and the tank is on its way to help beat back the Teuton and prevent him from leaving any more mementoes of his work in France.

One of the results of the great British victory at Cambrai was the liberating of 40 square miles of French territory. The civilians in the newly liberated villages saw way to unrestrained demonstrations of joy, for they had no hint that their release was near. They gathered up their belongings and temporarily left their homes going back to some village not far in the rear until the battle had swept further on and made it safe for them to return. So bearing bundles and pushing handcarts, wheelbarrows or perambulators, they make a little stream flowing against the great current of the army going forward.

The Kaiser paid a visit to his ally, the Sultan of Turkey, recently, and the Oppressor of Humanity greeted his Moslem partner in destruction of human rights. The Kaiser was on a diplomatic errand, concerning what, of course, is unknown.

A big German biplane, with huge iron crosses painted on its wings, is one of the prizes that fell to the British in the great drive on Cambrai. It was brought down at a place that when the drive started was far behind the Teuton lines, but soon fell to the British when the tanks and the cavalry speeded up in their famous drive.
