In a letter to The Oregonian, Colonel C. E. Dentler, former commander of the First Division, Western Military Department, sends a copy of his own suggestions to company commanders, intended to aid discipline and build up esprit.

Colonel Dentler, who is now in command of the 4th Infantry, stationed at Camp Dodge, Ia., has not forgotten his liking and esteem for the boys of the Third Oregon, and suggests that the publication of his ideas would be read by many of the men of that regiment, if appearing in The Oregonian.

"I believe the Third Oregon to be one of the best regiments in the service of the country," adds Colonel Dentler. The text of his suggestions is as follows:
