

MARTHUR MAKES CANDIDACY PUBLIC

Representative in Congress Pledges Support of President's War Programme.

NAVY IN PACIFIC DESIRED

Third Term Sought as Indorsement of Views That Winning of War Should Take Precedence Over Party Politics.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash- ington, Jan. 12.—C. N. McArthur, of Portland, today announced his candidacy for re-nomination as Representative in Congress at the Republican primaries on May 17, upon a platform pledging continued support of the Government's war programme, such general legislation as the times demand, an adequate Navy for the Pacific, and continued attention to legislation and departmental matters pertaining to the Oregon country. The full text of his announcement follows:

"In announcing my candidacy for re-nomination for Representative in Congress at the Republican primaries on May 17, I pledge myself unreservedly to the continued support of the Government's great task—the winning of the war. This is no time for petty partisanship or internal differences, for the duty which confronts us demands our best thought and our most patriotic endeavor. We are participants in a great struggle—a battle for democracy and humanity—and neither the dastardly influence of Protestantism, nor the camouflage of democracy should altar our purpose or divert our energies.

Challenge Offered Critics.
"I am a Republican and have an abiding faith in the principles of my party, but in common with other Republicans in Congress, have disregarded partisanship, have given vigorous and wholehearted support to the President's war programme, and have combated the secret and subtle influences of our enemies—both foreign and domestic—in their frequent efforts to influence Congressional action. I could not do less and count myself as a true American, and I challenge my political opponents and detractors to show where they would have done otherwise.

Navy in Pacific Desired.
"If re-elected I shall not only continue to support all proper war measures, but also such general legislation as the times demand. I shall also continue to urge the consideration of legislative matters affecting the Oregon country, and shall stand uncompromisingly for an adequate Navy and naval establishment on the Pacific. Meritorious departmental matters—particularly those pertaining to our soldiers and sailors and their dependents—will continue to have my serious attention."

MADAME H STILL FREE
Representative McArthur is serving his second term in the House and is a member of the committee on the Pacific. He has been a consistent advocate of preparedness—both naval and military—ever since coming to Congress in December, 1915, and has supported the President's entire war programme, as well as his position on the McAdams resolution and other questions leading up to the war.

creative forces of the German and French people. He added:
"The Russian government, however, wrote the word peace at the head of its programme. The great sympathies of the allies strengthen the desire to attain the speediest peace and understanding among the peoples.

Pretext Made Futile.
"To remove from the quadruple alliance a pretext for breaking off the peace negotiations on technical grounds, the Russian delegation accepts the demand to remain in Brest-Litovsk in order not to leave unutilized any possibility in the fight for peace. In announcing its proposal regarding the transfer of negotiations to neutral soil, the Russian delegation proposes continuation of the negotiations."

In elaborating the Ukrainian peace policy, said that any annexations or surrenders of territory without the consent of the people involved was inadmissible, as likewise were war indemnities. Material assistance should be extended to small states.
Inasmuch as the Russian Council of People's Commissioners did not represent Ukraine, he said, any peace which might be negotiated would be binding for Ukraine only if accepted by it. The same principle, he added, applied to the other Russian republics.
On the proposal of the president, it was decided to hold private deliberations between the delegations of Austria-Hungary and Germany on the one hand and of Russia on the other. The delegates of Russia, Germany and Austria-Hungary will form a committee to discuss political and territorial questions and a second committee of

experts for preliminary discussion of economic and legal questions. The former committee held a meeting.

SLAV OFFICERS BARRED

OFFER OF RUSSIAN TO SERVE WITH AMERICANS DECLINED.

U. S. Law Makes Transfer Impossible and Causes Disappointment to Would-Be American.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Jan. 12.—Because of the law that does not permit any but citizens of the United States to become officers in the American Army it has become necessary to refuse the offer of a Russian officer, representing a large number of brother Russian officers in France, to place a group of officers at the disposal of General Pershing, to be used as he might see fit. The decision also affects the plan of the United States Army to take over the Russian army in France to be utilized as a labor army at the same rate of pay as the American labor battalions.
Many of the Russian officers would have proved of great value to the American forces as instructors, aviators and interpreters. When their representative was informed by the American officials that it would be impossible to grant the request of himself and his comrades, he explained:
"I had hoped to be able to fight for Russian liberty under the Stars and Stripes and would gladly become a citizen of the United States for the privilege of serving in her armies. I am now a man without a country, but I am unable to fight. I shall offer my services to the Red Cross or the Young Men's Christian Association and endeavor to be of assistance to the men who are fighting."

MRS. GUSTORF NOT IMPORTANT

Suspect Still in Custody at Hanford, Cal., and Evidence Against Her is Sought.

HANFORD, Cal., Jan. 12.—Mrs. Elizabeth Gustorf, held here as a suspect German agent, is not "Madame H," the mysterious woman chief operative in this country of the German secret service. It was announced definitely late today by a member of the United States Army Intelligence Bureau investigating Mrs. Gustorf's activities.
Search for a handbag which the police said Mrs. Gustorf, arrested early yesterday with alleged seditious letters in her possession, and held as a suspected German agent, carried when she was first seen here, was begun today by the police.
Federal officers were expected to arrive today from Detroit to begin investigation of Mrs. Gustorf. If she holds to her story that she stopped at four different ranch houses while on her way here from her home in Santa Cruz, it is probable that she will be taken by the Federal authorities over the route she traversed and asked to point out the houses. The occupants will be asked to identify her.
Mrs. Gustorf was apprehended yesterday after she had been seen loitering around the postoffice here for two hours. The police said they found two seditious letters in her possession.

AUSTRIAN TO BE INTERNED

Former Orchestra Director Ordered to Fort Ogilthorpe.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 12.—Dr. Ernest Kunwald, former director of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, was en route tonight to Fort Ogilthorpe, Ga., in the custody of a detail of Fort Thomas soldiers for internment during the period of the war. This is the second time the orchestra director has been ordered interned. Several weeks ago he was apprehended by Government agents and taken to the Dayton, O., Jail. He was released within 13 hours and returned to his home here.
No announcement was made as to why Dr. Kunwald was taken into custody. He is an Austrian citizen and is said to be a reserve officer.

Soldier, Reported Dead, is Well.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—Mrs. Sadie Camp, of North Bend, who is visiting here and who is the mother of Harry Watkins, reported killed in France, has received a letter from her son saying that he is still alive, has almost recovered from his wounds and would be back in the trenches by the time the letter reached his mother.
Young Watkins is a former resident of Cottage Grove and a former member of the Sixth Company, Coast Artillery Corps, of this city.

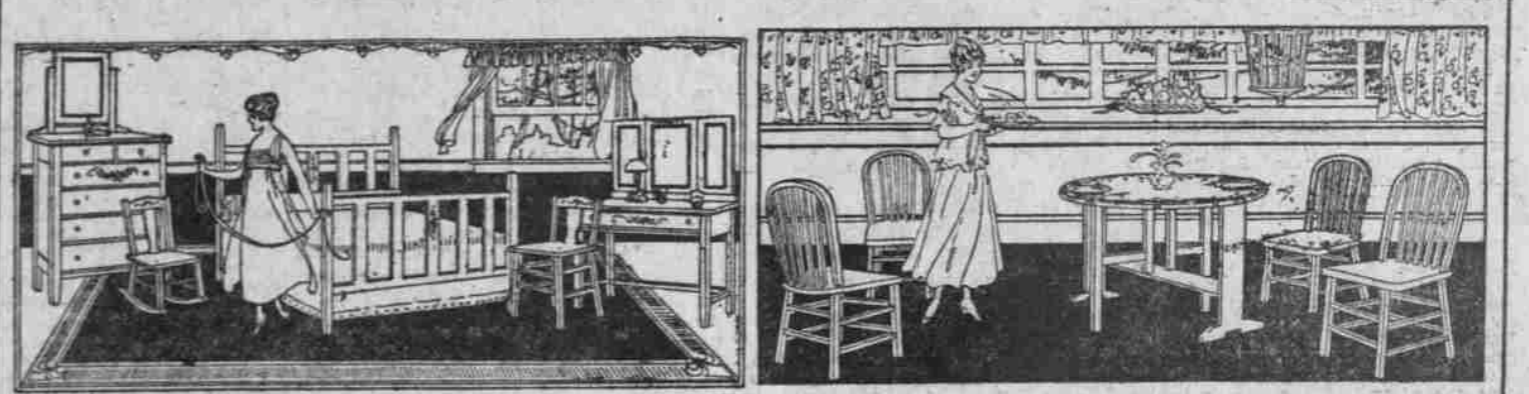

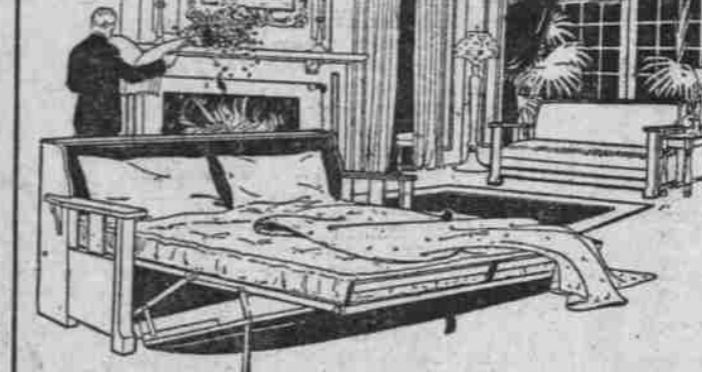

Michigan, Dr. Garfield today directed operators in the Pittsburg, Fairmont, Kanawha, Kenova, Thacker, Eastern Kentucky, Wellton and Ohio districts to give preferential shipments for 10 days to coal for those two states. The coal will be distributed by the State Fuel Administrators.
