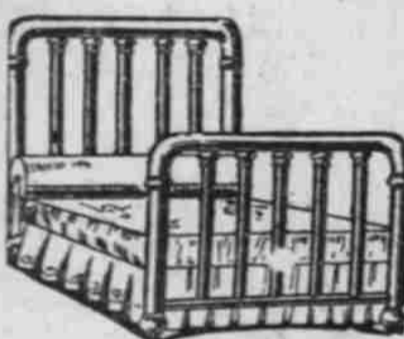

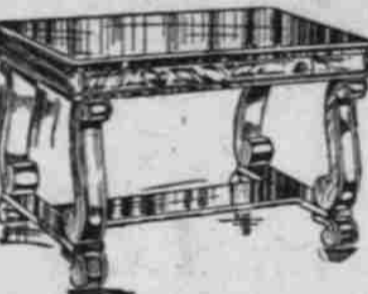

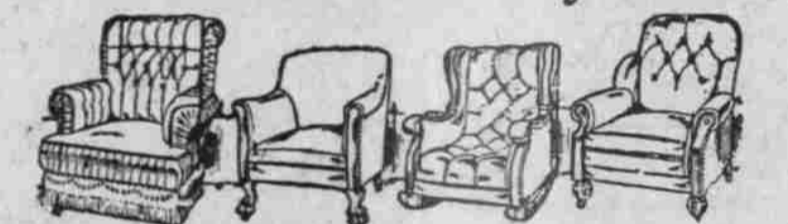

### M'CREIDIE IS GOING NORTH WEDNESDAY

Fans Soon to Know Something Definite After League Meeting at Seattle.

### TEAM NO WORRY TO JUDGE

"Lefty" James to Be Mainstay of Squad and It Seems Arthur C. Ritter May Be Another Ivan Olson at Short.

With the Northwest League meeting scheduled for next Thursday in Seattle it won't be long before the thousands of baseball fans of the Northwest will be able to sit down for breakfast and while they sip their coffee and they can peruse the sport page and gather some real live dope on what's doing in baseball.

The uncertainties which have been attached to the Portland club since the Pacific Coast League directors saw fit to remove the franchise to Sacramento and the exception of those fans who will follow the doing of the Sacramento club on account of the large number of former Portland players on Bill Rodgers' team but little interest will manifest itself in the Northwest regarding the outcome of games in President Baum's circuit.

Judge McCredie will leave Portland Wednesday night for Seattle. The Portland manager will abide by whatever the other directors suggest in the matter of schedules, player and salary limits, etc.

20-Week Schedule Voted.  
McCredie believes that a 20-week schedule would prove ideal for the Northwest, and as it seems to be the unanimous idea of all the club owners in the circuit that such a schedule would prove profitable from a playing and financial standpoint, the moguls undoubtedly will decide to continue playing for that length of time.

Judge McCredie season will have to be the lineup for the Portland team. With Walter McCredie hobnobbing around the East lining up players for the other clubs is not the least bit worried but that his nephew will annex a few signatures of some promising players for the Portland Northwesters.

The following players are on the Portland roster: Roy De Grief, Walla Walla; Lee F. Dempsey, Rock Island; W. L. (Lefty) James, Portland; Walter Malls (suspended), Seattle; John D. Martin, Duluth, Minn.; and Harry Morton, San Francisco, pitcher; Arthur C. Baker, shortstop; Royland, Henry Sands and George Armstrong, third basemen, San Francisco; Floyd (Jack) Farmer and Cliff Lee, outfielders; Red Baldwin and Joseph J. Dalley, catcher and pitcher, respectively, who are now in the Army.

Walter Malls' Case Fixed.  
Walter Malls, who was suspended by the McCredie season, will have to talk "turkey" with Judge McCredie before he will ever be allowed to don a baseball uniform in organized baseball. Malls, who is reported to have joined the service, is still the property of the Portland club.

Floyd Farmer will be sold to Detroit or else Walter McCredie will buy him on the Salt Lake club. Portland should be able to realize a nice piece of filthy lucre or at least three good players in exchange for Farmer, who was one of the classiest outfielders in the league last season.

Red Baldwin, catcher, and Joe Dalley, pitcher, are in the Army and will revert back to the Portland club. Both are wonderful prospects.

"Lefty" James will be the mainstay of the Portland pitching staff. When James hit his stride at the tail-end of last season he was a winner for the McCredies. A number of what Judge McCredie terms promising bushers have been signed up to report at training camp, and if Manager Paddy Signin can uncover two or three who were not he ought to feel satisfied.

Three semi-pro infielders have been corralled to date. One of these, Henry Sands, has been promised to Bill Rodgers of Sacramento, and it may be possible that Rodgers will take both Sands and Armstrong into camp, as they are both located at San Francisco, and it would be cheaper for McCredie to have them report to Rodgers, who can give them the "O.D." than to spend a pile of money bringing them north and then having to turn them around if they did not possess the necessary requisites.

The coming week promises to be a busy one for Pete Muldoon and his Portland ice hockey septet. The Rosebuds pile aboard the rattle today bound for Vancouver, B. C., where they are scheduled to clash with Frank Patrick's Vancouver "Millionaires" tomorrow night.

Immediately after their battle at Vancouver both Portland and Vancouver teams will return to Portland and continue their hostilities on Wednesday night. Friday night Seattle will entertain the Rosebuds in the Sound City.

With the number of games scheduled for this week there are apt to be some changes in the standings of the three teams.

Muldoon's Players in Shape.  
Muldoon's players are in great shape. Loughlin's injured optic is not giving him any trouble and the demon speed merchant will enter tomorrow night's fracas at Vancouver feeling in the "pink."

It was the general impression around the ice palace before Loughlin arrived from Winnipeg that Al Harbour might crowd Clem off the regular lineup, but the idea was "dynamited" shortly after Loughlin donned a uniform and started to show his caliber on the ice. Loughlin is one of the bright stars of the Rosebud offense and defense and when it comes to taking up and down the ice he has few equals.

"Dubble" Kerr will not join the Rosebuds at Vancouver tomorrow, as he has been hoped, as he has decided to stay out of the game this winter.

Portland and Seattle Tied.  
Portland and Seattle are tied for scoring honors. Each aggregation has tied the puck 12 times while Vancouver has only been able to evade the opposition's goal tender seven times. Portland has been scored against seven times in three games, which gives the Rosebuds the edge on defensive ability. The Seattle "Mets" have been tallied on 16 times in four games while the Vancouver "Mets" have been able to stave off all but 11 attempts by their opponents.

Roberts, of Seattle, with seven goals to his credit, leads the league. Roberts thrust the rubber disc past Vancouver's goal-tender three times last Friday night at Seattle. He is one of the best men in the league. Taylor, Vancouver, and Morris, Seattle, are tied for second place in the scoring column with four goals each. Morris was one of the best point-producers in the game, having scored, together with "Doc" Roberts, his teammate, should be able to run up enough points to keep the "Mets" up around the top of the percentage column.

Charlie Tobin, Eddie Oatman and Tommy Dunderdale, of the Portland team, are credited with three goals each. "Moose" Johnson, of the Rosebuds, has scored twice.

Lester Patrick to Front.  
Lester Patrick, manager of the Seattle team, leads in the assist column with three successful attempts at passing the puck to one of his teammates for a goal.

"Cully" Wilson, of Seattle, has drawn 26 minutes of penalties for roughness. The spunky right-wing player of the "Mets" always was noted for his ability to spill an opponent and, if need be, to take a wallop at him whether the referee was watching him or not. But outside of this defect in Wilson's ability, he is a grand player and always in the game.

Bernie Morris is second among the list of offenders, with eight minutes of enforced rest. Dunderdale, with six minutes, and Harris with half that amount, are the only Portlanders in the "shady" column.

Seattle players have been penalized for a total of 40 minutes. Vancouver has drawn 15 minutes of combined penalties, while the Portland septet are charged with nine minutes.

### CAMP ATHLETES TO BE LISTED

Men at American Lake Will Be Put in Proper Classes.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—Every athlete at Camp Lewis is to be carded by Captain C. G. Cook, athletic director. The men are divided into two classes and each will be asked to fill out a form. This blank will tell what outfit the man is in, whether he is a university, college, normal school, high school or organized club athlete, whether he has had any experience in coaching and what kind of sport in which he is proficient.

No. 1 sports are classed as football, soccer, basketball, track cross-country, baseball, boxing, wrestling, swimming and indoor baseball. No. 2 sports are tennis, lacrosse, fencing, handball, volleyball, bowling, gymnastics, calisthenics, water polo and golf. "This will mean that we will have a line on all the men at the camp and with this system we should be able to make headway with athletics," commented Captain Cook.

### DEER SLAUGHTER URGED

HUNTER PROPOSES THAT ANIMALS BE KILLED FOR FOOD.

In Letter to Governor Withycombe It Is Suggested That After War Season Could Be Closed.

Carl D. Shoemaker, State Game Warden, has on file in his office an interesting letter from a woodsman who has a plan to relieve the food shortage. The letter was written to Governor Withycombe, who referred it to Warden Shoemaker. Here it is:

"I have a suggestion to make in regard to food conservation which I sincerely hope may meet with approval. I propose that there be made a certain number of official deer and game hunters in different parts of the state and allow them to slaughter deer and all game and put on the market for the public under the supervision of the state.

"After the war we could have a closed season for ten years if necessary to bring the game back to normal."

"That last clause would be enough to get a rife out of the hunters," said Warden Shoemaker. "I'm not quite sure whether this man wants the state to finance him on a hunting trip or whether he just wants an open season on the deer. In any case, the Game Commission will have to disagree with him."
