

W. OF C. BRUSADERS RECOUP UP \$57,000

War Fund Drive Whirlwind Affair During Final Hours of Week.

TOTAL MAY REACH \$60,000 Fully \$10,000 of Big Fund Collected in Residence Districts—Officials Are Gratified Over Result of Campaign.

The Knights of Columbus put it over. They walked right past the fund seal they had established. Tabulated returns last night showed a total of \$57,000 pledged. It was predicted that unreported subscriptions will bring the sum to \$60,000.

Everybody is pleased. Hearty appreciation of the splendid efforts and worthy achievements were voiced not only by the Archbishop but by "Field General" I. N. Day, Executive Chairman John N. Casani and other drive directors.

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Groups of faithful women workers, under Mrs. J. P. O'Brien, gathered in a total of approximately 14000. Girls from the Grant Smith-Carter-Quinn Company gave to the collectors \$570. All contributions of the Foundation Company employees amounted to \$320.

One Building Gives \$675. Occupants of the Wells-Fargo building led in the list of employe groups in size of collective donations, giving an aggregate of \$675.

An effective speaking campaign among the labor unions, other organizations and on the street corners did much to stir enthusiasm and draw subscriptions during the final 36 hours of the crusade.

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WOODSMEN ARE NEEDED REMEMBER THE SABBATH DAY

3000 RECRUITS SOUGHT FOR ENGINEERS' REGIMENT. Experienced Timbersmen Wanted for Immediate Service With American Army in France.

To round out new battalions in the 20th Engineers, often referred to as the Lumbermen's Regiment and Auxiliary for the army, experienced woodsmen and lumbermen are needed at once.

Urgent calls for these 3000 experienced woodsmen and sawmill men have just been sent out from Washington by C. E. Clark and H. L. Egan, Major in the Engineer Reserve Corps, acting for Major-General Black, chief of engineers.

With the addition of the recruits now sought, the 20th Engineers will be the largest regiment in the world, it is said, the prospective roster being 7000 men. Four new battalions of 750 men each are needed now.

This work to be done in France consists of converting forests into military camps, such as ties, bridge timbers, telephone poles, etc. Applicants must have had years of practical experience in the woods or in sawmills to be accepted.

Men wishing to enlist in one of these units are requested to write or telephone to Major C. E. Clark, office chief of Engineers, room 25, War Department, Washington, D. C.
