Visiting Day Is New Feature at Lincoln High.

Memory of Franklin Honored at Special Assembly.

High School Students Observe Anniversary of His Birth With Patriotic Program—Student Body Is Commended for Enthusiasm.

JANUARY 17, the anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin, was observed in a special assembly. A program of a patriotic nature, emphasizing the world's long struggle for democracy, was given by the students, under the supervision of I. A. Melendy. The exercise opened with the singing of "The Star-Spangled Banner," by the student body, led by R. B. Walsh, of the music department. "A Biographical Sketch of Benjamin Franklin," was given by Luella Hanks. Dorothy Stevens gave President Wilson's "War Message of April 2, 1917." Lucille Marsh recited "Lloyd George's Message to America," and Alice Dryden read an extract from a letter written by Professor Meyer on the subject, "Free From the German."
