April 12 Is Final Time for Filing Petitions or Declarations for State Offices.

BOOKS CLOSE APRIL 16

Secretary Olcott Compiles Chronology on Coming Primary and General Elections for Distribution in Near Future.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 26,-(Special.)-A hronology of election dates as applying to the primary and general elections just been compiled by Secretary of State Olcott and will be published for distribution within a short time to those interested.

The primary election, the chronology shows, is to be held May 17. On April

After April 16 County Clerks shall refuse to register any elector preceding the primary election, the law requiring that the books shall be closed for 36 days prior to the election. On May 8 is the latest date on which the Secretary of State is to forward primary pamphlets to the voters.

Other election dates as to the general and primary elections are covered in an extensive way in the pamphlet. Attached are the dates still remaining before the primary election, the general election dates being given in the pamphlet but not included here:




