

### ATTENTION CALLED TO WAR INSURANCE

Red Cross Urges Action in Behalf of Dependents of Oregon Boys.

#### CABLEGRAMS PROVIDED FOR

Relatives of Soldiers May Pay Premiums on Policies, Which in Case of Death of Insured Are Equivalent to Pensions.

The Portland chapter of the American Red Cross is arranging for scores of cablegrams to be sent to Oregon boys in France asking them to authorize relatives to apply for war insurance in their behalf.

Mrs. J. N. Davis, secretary of the civilian relief committee, is swamped with applicants who realize that if they are to get the benefit of cheap insurance, which really amounts to a monthly pension for 20 years, there is no time to lose.

The Portland chapter will defray the cost of cablegrams or telegrams to Oregon soldiers or sailors wherever they may be.

#### Immediate Action Urged.

The whole problem of after-the-war dependency depends on immediate action being taken now by relatives of Oregon soldiers," said Robert H. Strong, chairman of the civilian relief section of the Red Cross.

Anyone can pay the cost of the monthly premium, if it is desired that the soldier or sailor himself should not pay them, but authorization is required to make the insurance effective.

The policy is payable in monthly installments running for 20 years in case of death of the soldier; in case of permanent and total disability the policy will be paid in monthly installments for the balance of his life, or if he lives a shorter time than 20 years, the payments will be to his near-relative, if that relative be one entitled to receive the payments under the Government plan for a total of 20 years, including the time the soldier had received benefit thereof.

#### Cable Directions Given.

To secure the authorization of a soldier, cablegrams may be sent at a special rate of 3 cents per word (the usual rate is 27 cents). They must be addressed in the following specified manner:

For an Army man: EMP AMEXFORCE LONDON

Then, as the first part of the message, give the name, company and regiment of the man addressed.

The address for naval men abroad is: EMP USNAVFORCE LONDON

Then follows name, ship, etc., as part of message.

Here is a typical message, one of more than a score dispatched yesterday by the Red Cross, which is defraying bills wherever requested:

EMP AMEXFORCE LONDON

"John Smith, Company D, 162d Regiment; Cable me rush authorization make application ten thousand war insurance for you. Will make future cash. Most important. Cost only . . . per month. See commanding officer. Cable immediate answer. Time must be February 12. MARY SMITH."

#### Full Name Necessary.

The full name must be attached to the message and even if the actual address in France is known, the cable must be sent as shown in the foregoing.

A \$1000 policy will pay \$5.75 per month for 20 years in case of death or permanent disability. A \$10,000 policy will pay \$57.50 per month for 20 years. In other words, for each \$1000 of policy the benefits are \$5.75 per month. The cost of a \$1000 policy is 46 cents a month to a man aged 25, a \$5000 policy \$2.50 a month, \$10,000, \$4.50 per month. A relative or anyone else may pay the premiums if the soldier does not wish to pay them.

#### Possible Beneficiaries Named.

Those who may benefit from the insurance, in addition to the soldier, are: Wife, child, grandchild, brother or sister, stepbrother or step-sister, as well as parent, grandparent or stepparent, either of enlisted man or his wife.

Here is a table showing the cost per month of \$1000 policy. A \$10,000 policy would cost ten times as much, and so on.

Among the Oddfellows each lodge takes care of its own needy, but many members of lodges in other parts of the United States and Canada have removed to Portland and it is the work of the general relief committee to see that the example of Good Samaritan is not forgotten. This committee expends and distributes thousands of dollars annually.

### NEWBERG ADOPTS BUDGET

City Expenses Curtailed in Statement Prepared by Attorney Chapin.

NEWBERG, Or., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—At its meeting Monday night the City Council will adopt the financial segregated budget planned by City Attorney Chapin for taking care of the city's finances.

The budget, as outlined by the City Attorney, will curtail the current expenses of the city, but will keep the city's credit gilt-edged. The plan is based upon an income of \$10,000 from water receipts and \$12,000 from general taxes, together with the rentals of the city hall, licenses and fines. The total indebtedness of the city is \$142,500, as follows: Sewer bonds, \$52,000; water, \$46,000; city hall, \$15,000; city park, \$30,000; municipal, \$39,500.
