

Portions of Streams to Be Closed After February 15.

Fish and Game Commission of Oregon has decided to close, for the present, excisin points in the county that have been open hitherto to anglers. The new order becomes effective February 15 and includes the following waters: Nour-Mile Lake and Four-Mile Creek to a point one-half mile before its out-let; Klamsth River from a point 800 Feet below its confluence with Spencer Creek to a point 200 feet above and confluence. Spencer Creek from its con-tinence with Klamath River to a point where a physical diverts water to the Energy with klamath River to a point where a pipeline diverts water to the Spencer Creek hatchery: Seven-Mile Creek in Wood River Valley from its confluence with the Weed canal to the moint where Short Creek flows into it. 
