## PALESTINE NEEDS CLOTHES

Hadassah Begins' Campaign to Send

Needed Supplies to Jews.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25 .- Hadassas, the woman's society associated with the Zionist organization, is co-operating with the Palestine Restoration Fund Commission to send several tons of clothing to the natives of Palestine, great numbers of whom now have lit-tle but tattered rags. Several hundred women volunteers will canvass the department stores and manufacturing houses to secure contributions of shelfworn garments and materials.

Already the women have gathered nearly 10,000 garments to be sent to Palestine. Sewing circles have been formed in 60 cities. Baltimors has sent a ton of clothing to the New York office of Hadassas for shipment and another ton from San Francisco is in transit. In addition to the clothing the women are planning to send say-
