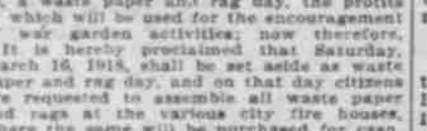

FRANCE WEATHER LIKED

BERTIE W. C. STROM WRITES OF TRIP OVER THERE. Tuscania Survivor Tells of Gift Received From Sestheman Who Has Been in War Four Years.

On the Tuscania when the Hun torpedo caught that luckless troopship, was Sergeant W. C. Strom, of headquarters company, 148th Field Artillery.

Quite evidently the misadventure was written immediately after the detachment left camp in Great Britain and crossed the Channel to France, for it makes mention of all-night rides by train and of embarkation and disembarkation.

"I met a Scotchman with the Royal Engineers, last night," he writes. "He gave me a velvet belt with all the flags of the allies woven in it. This belt has been to England, India, Belgium, France and Egypt. He gave it to me to remember him by. I gave him that little Masonic pin in return."

"We had a great time on the boat. He has been in the war four years, and wore the belt constantly. He was wounded and there are stains on the belt. I told him I would try and carry the belt as far as he did, and take as good care of it."

"When we got off the boat this morning we had to unload our supplies and there were five or six crates upon the ramp. We were all seeing the world. This is the prettiest place we have struck yet. The weather is just great and everything is green and nice."
